


# **Lead Stories**





elcome to this edition of the Oaklands News.

A happy, if not belated, New Year to you all. I hope everyone had a restful holiday after a busy term.

Over the last few months we have had a number of staff who have had or are expecting babies, sometimes twins. It is always a joyous occasion when a colleague tells me of a pending arrival. One of the first tasks for new parents is to name their children. For teachers this is often difficult because certain names conjure up images we may wish to forget! In addition to our name, in our working lives we get given names, titles, or tags that define our responsibilities or describe our work. When I worked as a surveyor on building sites many electricians were called 'sparks'. Our job descriptions say something about us: if you get named a 'team leader' then that shows that the organisation trusts you to look after the work of a few people.

In the Gospel reading last Sunday we heard Jesus saying to Simon, "Simon son of John you are to be called Cephas". Cephas is also translated 'Peter'. Peter means Rock. You could be forgiven for being a little confused in interpreting these translations until we realise that Jesus spoke Aramaic, the gospels were written in Greek and we speak English. From what we know about Peter he seems an unlikely choice to be called 'The Rock'. Jesus knew better and trusted Peter. When Jesus asked his disciples "Who do you say I am?", Simon Peter answered, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" and it is this statement that prompts Jesus' famous words, "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church." Jesus has defined Peter's future role.

We must not lose sight of the names we are given that describe our role and calling, something that originates from our baptism; in addition to our Christian names, we are called to be disciples of Christ and this defines the responsibility we have been given. Fortunately we do not have to do this in isolation and we do not have to look too far to see there is quite a job to do.

#### **School Results**

The powers that be, have made things so much harder for schools to meet the standards. This summer, our

exams changed to being linear, this means that where previously students have been able to study modules and

take exams at intervals during the year, we have reverted back to an exam at the end of GCSE and A Level courses. Many exams have changed with coursework elements disappearing or being significantly reduced. All in all the exam process now is much harder than it was for students over many years and, as a result, schools and the staff within them have had to adapt accordingly. Whilst other schools may have and continue to 'game the system' to improve league table positon, this has not been our way and it is mine and the governors view that this does not serve students well. Although it remains controversial, against the Ebac measure which strips out all the equivalences leaving schools with the tougher GCSEs, we remain one of the top Hampshire Secondary schools. Not bad for a truly comprehensive intake. At the beginning of this term we received the GCSE value added measure. Our value added has always been good. I am very proud to report that this year's measure has significantly surpassed expectation.

#### **University Success**

Congratulations to all students in Year 13 who have sent their applications to the University and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) well before the January deadline and have been receiving offers from their universities of choice. Again this year we have nearly one hundred university hopefuls some of who are Oxbridge hopefuls. All these students need to secure the highest possible A and A\* grades on their A2 courses. Enormous thanks and congratulations go to the



Sixth Form tutors for their preparation of references and support in helping students write their personal statements.

#### **Busy Year Ahead**

The Christmas season was particularly busy for the Music department. In addition to the Peripatetic concert, they contributed to the Christmas Fayre, Christmas Music Concert, Carol Service and the events in local community. ### E-Praise is back

### ewarding students at Oaklands

We all know that by positively reinforcing good behaviour or work we can inspire young people to Here at Oaklands we have a school aim higher. rewards system which awards individual Reward Points, House Points, stickers and praise postcards. Students are often rewarded for outstanding work, excellent effort, attendance or contribution to school life. We also have an online reward system called epraise which gives each student their own Reward Account, where they can see which tutor group or House is in the lead, where they can redeem their points in the online shop or donate them to charity. Staff award points electronically so that students can see why they were awarded a point and by whom. They also earn epraise points for uniform, literacy, numeracy and lots more!

But the system is not just about points – it also has the functionality to award Accolades (private praise messages), or to reach Achievement Milestones for such things as Sports Day, extra-curricular activities, department challenges, House competitions etc. Staff also find it very convenient and flexible as they



find it supports more consistency in their awarding of points; Heads of Year and Tutors also enjoy being able to give pastoral reward points. It gives us an immediate and "real time" snapshot of House and Student Points.

The online "shop" offers great purchases such as phone cases, notebooks, pens, key rings, rugby and football merchandise, earphones, stress balls, vouchers and much much more.

We have had some recent administration changes which have slowed down our normal stock replenishment, but I am delighted to inform you and the students that it is now open for business again! Students order on line and then collect their purchases on Thursdays from our Business Support office in the White House.

We hope that this system highlights the motivation and commitment of our students, and continues to build positive relationships between staff and students. Why not have a look at your child's account and see how well they are doing?

### **School Council**

# **Anti Bullying Week**



nti-bullying week (November 17<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup>) **1** this year focused on highlighting the ways in which disabled people can be marginalised in our society and in our school. All year groups had an assembly on that theme with follow up work in PDC lessons which looked at 'Let's stop bullying for all'. Bullying is never acceptable and we need to work together to make sure our school is a safe and happy one for all. Bullying is defined as something which goes on for a while or happens regularly; is deliberate and aimed at hurting, humiliating or harming the target and

involves someone who has some kind of 'power' over the person being bullied (e.g. older, stronger or knows a 'secret' about them). Bullying is not a one off fight or argument, a friend being nasty or an argument with a friend.

Through our student bulletin, students were reminded of our **5 A Day**; if we make these things a reality within our school then we will all be behaving in a way which is keeping with our school code of conduct and we will be showing respect for others. In particular, students were invited to reflect on how we behave towards others, how we speak to others and how we interact with them on social media and to make sure that we do not act in any way which would cause hurt or upset to them. Most importantly the week reminded us to make sure that if we witness bullying, we must report it and if anyone is being bullied, they must seek help from an adult in school.

#### **Parent information**

There is an App known as YiK YAK that is a location based social media App that has been used for extensive cyberbullying in some local schools. It can be run on iOS and Android devices. Please be aware that this exists as, unfortunately, it provides the opportunity for anonymous comments to be posted.

# **Primary History Work**



On Friday 9<sup>th</sup> January 2015 60 Year 2 pupils from St Peter's Catholic Primary School in Waterlooville ventured over to Oaklands to start their new topic on Kings and Queens. They started the morning with a presentation by Mrs Masson, Assistant Head of History, by beginning to think about why anyone would want to be a King or a Queen. The general consensus was to boss other people around! The pupils then had to think what a King or a Queen might look like. What followed was some frantic and detailed drawing to show crowns, capes and thrones.

The bulk of the session was run by the History Club at Oaklands. This 30 strong group of Year 7 and 8 students meet regularly to complete projects and research time periods of their choosing. After going over to St Peter's to deliver lessons to small groups last year, they felt ready to invite the Year 2 students up to Oaklands.

When they were told that they had to choose just six monarchs the History Club debated at length as to which six to choose but finally settled on Elizabeth II, Victoria, Charles I, Elizabeth I, Henry VIII and King John. The Year 2 students had to circulate, spending ten minutes at each station. While there they had to collect information about how long the monarch had ruled and a positive and negative aspect of their rule. They were helped along the way by activities and clips that had been sourced and created by the History Club.

When the session concluded the Year 2 students had to choose the monarch that they felt was the most important and give a reason why, a task that most of them could do!

All the students left with a smile on their face, the History Club were very impressed with the ability and focus of the Year 2s who were enthusiastic and keen to learn. We hope that more cross-phase activities like this will allow students to learn from each other in a situation that is more relaxed than a classroom environment.

# **Playground Rivers**

The Oaklands Geography department delivered 'Playground Rivers' sessions to Year 5 pupils at Mill Rythe Primary School on Hayling Island in late November and early-December.

Students in Year 5 at Mill Rythe had been studying rivers last term and were delighted to have a visit from the Geography department to provide them with a learning activity outside of the classroom.





Fortunately, Mr. Bamford did manage to find a slope on their school site and was able to provide a session that enabled the students to understand the following:

Predict the path of the river Determine how rivers transport sediment Have an appreciation of landforms created by rivers Develop team work

The students engaged really well and were able to utilise advanced terminology by the end of the sessions.

The department intend to run these sessions at other feeder primary schools in the area. Other departments at the school also have activities planned to forge closer links with our potential feeder primary schools over the course of this academic year.

### Uniform

The vast majority of students wear uniform correctly and in accordance with the governors' policy. However, there are a small number of students who continue to arrive in school having left home, when they are parents responsibility, incorrectly dressed. The long dark nights and cold weather mean it's time to turn our thoughts to what our students are wearing. We ask you to help us maintain high uniform standards by supporting the uniform rules:

Scarves: a plain navy or black scarf. Patterned or coloured scarves will be confiscated.

Coats: no more arguments in shops about what is allowed! These should be either plain navy

blue or black without a logo (grey or other colours are <u>not</u> permitted). Coats should be worn <u>over</u> the blazer. **Hoodies, in any form, are not an acceptable item of uniform** 

and will be confiscated.

Boys' please be aware that boys' trousers must be formal tailored trousers and that chinos are

trousers: not permitted.

**Shoes**: formal black shoes (girls – heels should be lower than 2"). Plimsolls and trainer-type

shoes are not permitted.

**Girls skirt** we are continually concerned that some girls are wearing their skirts at an inappropriately short length and this compromises their dignity. We would appreciate your help. Please

short length and this compromises their dignity. We would appreciate your help. Please ensure they are bought at the correct length – ie: knee length – and that you check the

length before they leave home. Skirts rolled up at the waist are not acceptable.

Where can I buy uniform? All items of our uniform are available at Skoolkit in Havant or Fareham — embroidered or logoed items must be purchased from this supplier. Alternatively, you can purchase any uniform item online with Skoolkit and have it delivered to your doorstep. However, in order to offer more choice to parents you may buy any of the plain items at high street stores providing that they meet the uniform guidelines (eg: the skirt should be plain navy with sewn down pleats etc). The choice is yours!



# **Attendance**

A ttendance is the single most important factor in success at school – both academic and social. If you're not there, you can't learn! Reading someone else's notes is never the same as your own work. Our overall school attendance for Term 1 this year is: 95.7% - which is really excellent.

All absences contribute to our overall percentage but there are various ways you can help us: **Illness** accounts for 3.1% of all absence – it is important to only keep your son/daughter off school if they are genuinely too ill to come in. **Holidays** account for 0.3% of our absence figures (unauthorised Family Holiday accounts for 0.18%) – we strongly recommend that you do NOT take your child on a holiday during term time. The governors' policy clearly states that holidays will not be authorised unless there are extraordinary extenuating circumstances which are outlined in the policy. It affects students learning and chances of success in later life. 17 absent sessions = one grade less at GCSE. Do you want to disadvantage their future? Medical appointments make up 0.31% of our absence – please try to make appointments after school hours. Don't be too quick to agree to your child having a day off – are they really that ill?

Some parents have received letters alerting them that their son/daughter may be a Persistent Absentee (ie: either in or close to 85%). Please attend the meetings with the Head of Year and Senior Leader to agree a Personal Attendance Plan. Parents in England and Wales have a legal responsibility to ensure their children attend school. If they fail to do so, they are committing an offence under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

#### Holidays:

Please note that the school will not authorise a leave of absence for the purpose of a holiday. Since September 2013 the Department for Education has stated that Headteachers may no longer authorise this type of absence unless there are extraordinary circumstances, for example: a parent who is in the Forces and recently returned from deployment. Parents who remove their children from school are very likely to be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice, in line with Hampshire County Council's new Code of Conduct regarding holiday absence.

# **A Few Important Reminders**

gain this year many students were fortunate enough to be given a new mobile phone or tablet device for Chistmas. We live in a technological age; over half the people in Britain use mobile phones in a wide variety of settings and for a variety of reasons:

The school recognises that a total ban on mobile phones in school is both unrealistic and unreasonable. Equally, there are advantages in using smart phones and tablets as an educational resource. They are part of everyday technology and students need to be aware of how to use technology appropriately. They give some students a greater sense of safety and security particularly on a long journey to and from school. However, since our school site is generally a very safe place, we consider that in most circumstances, the whole school day should be considered as phone and We electronic device free. continue to recommend that students do not bring their mobile phones or other electronic devices to school. They are very expensive items and, if they go missing, the will school not take responsibility for them.

Mobile phones or other electronic devices are not to be used or seen during the school day (8:50-3:40) and must be switched off at all times including break and lunchtimes. The school's normal disciplinary sanctions will apply in cases where mobile phones or electronic devices are used inappropriately whilst on the school site. In most circumstances, this will include the temporary confiscation of devices by staff and appropriate arrangements being made for their return to parents.

#### **Detentions**

All parents know that from time to time youngsters step the wrong side of the line. With good parenting comes the resposibility for setting clear boundaries and, where necessary, taking action when boundaries are pushed. school one of the sanctions we have at our disposal is a detention. This can occur during school, after school, inset days or on Saturday If your child is mornings. detained during school time then they will normally be asked to write in their planner so that you are aware.

With both in and after school detention the 2011 Education Act, in addition to giving schools the power to search students and sanction students for behaviour outside school. states that parental consent is not required for detentions and detentions outside school hours can be issued on the same day. Whilst the law is unambiguous, quite Oaklands we are aware that for some students transport to from school creates and issues for same day detentions. In most circumstances parents will be given advanced notice pending detention. However, in the final analysis if a parent does not agree to a detention then the sanction can escalate to the point where a youngster is excluded. I am sure all parents would want to avoid this. Finally, if you do receive a detention letter for your child, please remind them of their responsibility to attend the detention as directed.

# Conduct on the way to and from school

You may remember on number of occasions over the last year I have written in the Oaklands News about student conduct to and from school, particularly on the buses. This generated a mixed post bag, particularly the specific issue related to sanctioning students for their behaviour outside of school and the reliability of the services. particularly from Portsmouth.

behaviour of the vast majority of students is exemplary and this is a significant\_factor that helps the school maintain the reputation it enjoys, this is something that neither I nor the governors wish to see eroded. The school will take action against students who compromise the school's reputation due to their behaviour outside of school. As I am sure can appreciate 'drilling down' into what occurs on the way to and from school is a difficult process. Your support in reinforcing the good behaviour that is demonstrated by the vast majority of students is greatly appreciated.

Thank you for your cooperation on these three important issues.


