In our comfort zone, there is a sense of familiarity, security and certainty. When we step outside of our comfort zone, we're taking a risk, and opening ourselves up to the possibility of stress and anxiety; we're not quite sure what will happen and how we'll perform.

Over the holiday I decided to take myself out of my comfort zone. I decided I need to push myself, so one middle aged bloke embarked on a 450km cycle ride to Belgium. There were 100 reasons not to cycle to Brussels, part of moving outside your comfort zone is just getting on with it.

Oaklands Sixth Form students again triumphed in their A Level exams of summer 2018 with a 99.2% success rate and our highest achievers claiming places on some of most competitive degree courses.

David Vahey achieved a stunning four A*s in Chemistry, Maths, Further Maths and Physics as well as achieving an A* in his EPQ and is leaving us to study Chemistry at Oxford University. In addition **Eleanor Ferris** will study Medicine at Oxford with three A* grades, one A grade and an EPQ A* as well.

Equally praiseworthy are the students who all secured their university places in Medicine, English, Social Work, Geology, Veterinary Sciences, Film Production, Criminology, Biomedical Engineering, History, Geography and Law - to name but a few - at the UK's top universities. We are enormously proud of all students' outcomes noting the many students moving from A Levels this year to Higher Level Apprenticeships in a range of sectors. We will miss everyone's brilliance and wish them all the best of luck in all future endeavours.

Belinda Ludlam, Director of Sixth Form Learning, said, "the results are tremendous and reflect the high standards that we set for our students in the Sixth Form. Our students can be justifiably proud of all the hard work that has underpinned their success, I am immensely proud of them all".

For GCSE students the waiting was over on 23rd August. The school is delighted to report a very successful year's GCSE results. With 83% achieving the gold standard in English and 73% in Maths.

100% of all students gained GCSE passes. A large number of students from the year group will now be going on to study A levels within the school Sixth Form.


Similar to last year there were a significant number of students who achieved seven or more top grades at either 9 or A*.

Pastoral Care at Oaklands

The quality of pastoral care at Oaklands is often cited as a reason why students are happy and successful in school.

In keeping with our distinctive Catholic ethos, we make a significant investment in the provision of quality pastoral care, recognising that our mission statement of 'no-one left behind' must be a lived reality.

Over the years we have continued to develop a model which is fit for purpose in an ever-changing educational and social landscape.

In addition, we have a Pastoral Team comprising of **Mrs Standen**, Key Stage 3 Pastoral Officer, **Mrs Pratt**, Key Stage 4 Pastoral Officer, **Mrs Whittingham**, Welfare and Safeguarding Manager and **Mr Jones**, Alternative Provision Manager

Mrs Nicholls is our Inclusions Manager.

Mrs Oldroyd, the Pastoral Deputy Head, is the Designated Safeguarding Lead and fully trained in Child Protection & Safeguarding along with the Deputy Designated Safeguarding Leads, Mrs Whittingham, Mrs Bonnington, Mrs Standen, Mrs Pratt and Mr Jones. They work with external agencies to support families and children.

We continue to have one staff member who is a qualified counsellor, Mrs Libby who heads up Student Services.

Our student mentor, Mr Phil Hoar comes in weekly to see students on a one to one basis as does our 'listening ear', Mrs Elaine Pearce.

All decisions regarding students being referred for any additional behaviour, social or emotional support are made by Mrs Oldroyd and the pastoral team in school.

We also have good working relationships with external agencies such as the Havant Early Help Hub, Supporting Troubled Families, SDAS, PARCS and Catch 22 and we are very well supported by our local police; PC Terence Burke, PCSO Carl Boxall and PCSO Lee Hayward. This helps to ensure that we have access to specialist help when it is needed. We also advise parents when we think a referral to Motiv8, Off the Record, the school nurse or CAMHS are appropriate and support with these.

Often, parents find it challenging to know where to turn when problems occur. We would encourage parents and carers to refer to the parent section of the website ('useful articles / links' section) which has updated articles posted on topical issues.

Home school communication for pastoral issues

Parents should always use the form tutor as the first port of call when there are any concerns about their child or if there is personal information that needs to be shared with school e.g. a family bereavement. Form tutors, where possible, stay with their tutor groups from year 7 to 11; they see the children every morning and build up relationships with them over time so should be contacted with any pastoral issues.

We would politely request that parents do not discuss concerns related to students with reception or other staff; they are not in a position to help as they do not know the individual children. All pastoral issues should go directly to the tutor and / or the Head of Year.

To continue to promote good home—school communication, there are dedicated email addresses for each form tutor and Head of Year. These are on the school website with the links for ease of use and will be located in the Parents' section of the website in 'pastoral contacts'. Heads of Year / Form tutors will check this email address once a day during the working week and parents can expect a response within two working days.

We recognise that emails can be an effective and convenient way to communicate when used appropriately. Please note, however, that an email to your child's form tutor is not a suitable way to communicate if it is an emergency or if it is a matter better discussed on the phone or in a meeting. If it is an emergency, please phone reception. If it is something you wish to talk about on the phone or in a meeting you can of course email to set this up.

Supervision of Students

The school site is open for parents to drop off and collect their children.

Parents / carers need to be aware that there is no active supervision of the students until 8.25am. Students, once they come on site, should move to the hard play areas / top and bottom playgrounds where a member of staff is on duty in this area from 8.25am until 8.50am. Students may also go the canteen before school. Once the bell rings at 8.50am, students move to the Hall for assembly or to their tutor bases. Should there be inclement weather, the site staff will advise the senior leader on site who will make alternative and appropriate arrangements as to where students should go, as required.

At the end of the day there is active supervision on the drive until the last bus has gone. If students are staying behind for after school activities, the parent will have agreed with their child the place / time for collection. Some activities have a clear start / finish time and this is listed in the extracurricular timetable published each term. Others, like homework club, operate a sign in, sign out procedure as the start and finish times are entirely dependent on the amount of homework a child has to complete. All staff running after school activities maintain a register of attendance.

At the end of the school day students should be either onsite in a designated or chosen activity, with parental knowledge or they should be off site. It is not permissible for students to be waiting on our school site for significant periods of time awaiting collection by parents. If a student is concerned at the end of the school day or after an activity because a parent has not turned up, then they can report to main reception up to 4pm or find a member of the site staff/ senior leadership team to obtain help.

Please help us to keep your child safe on site by reading these arrangements and co-operating with them.

The Oaklands Way

A t Oaklands, students are being helped to work their hardest and find their best skills and interests to make good things happen for themselves. Equally the teaching staff strive to improve resources, strategies and focus in the learning space.

Several factors have combined in our approach to a strong teaching and learning strategy which will bring benefits for both teachers and students alike. It is strengthened by consultation with our teachers, support staff and educational research from a number of sources including OFSTED's latest training and PIXL resources.

In addition to educational knowledge and learning habits at Oaklands we wanted to consider the importance of our ethos as a Christian school and our distinctiveness as a Catholic secondary school. Oaklands is a phenomenon, a unique educational experience and we know that there *is* an Oaklands way of doing things, and staff and learners alike benefit from it being clearly expressed.

The Oaklands Way 2018 is for teachers, support staff, students and parents. It is an expression of our approach this year forwards. It has three strands and aims to distil all that we wish to achieve for the benefit of the community of people that belong to Oaklands. We want to introduce certainty to every teacher and learner's day at Oaklands. All staff aim to be consistent in their practice in every subject and at each key stage.

- 1. **Thinking Hard** an account of thinking levels ensuring teachers plan lessons that differentiate powerfully and allow students to progress even further in their subjects. Students follow a hierarchy of thinking skills that begins with identifying and copying, reducing and highlighting and building through increasingly complex thought processes. This will help construct meaning from information so students can adapt to new situations with facts they have acquired. Vital thinking skills for every exam candidate.
- 2. Shared Language an Oaklands framework of spoken or written descriptors that each teacher will employ to indicate exactly how the learner needs to respond in a lesson. Is the task shared or individual, should they be talking to one another in person, listening to the teacher or a small group or exchanging opinions with a larger audience? Beautifully designed posters with each of the shared language terms will be in every classroom.
- **3. Teachers' Toolbox** There is easy access to a plethora of teaching and learning materials and advice these days yet it can be hard to find time to analyse and assess these with the limited time teachers have. We want to grow and develop our classroom practice but having the time to browse the multiple articles and books is time-consuming. The new Teaching & Learning group will ensure a constant stream of ideas for all staff as well as facilitating sharing across and within departments, with a rewrite of the INSET programme to allow more time and space for exploring. This will result in deeper thinking in our planning and delivery.
- 4. **Culture and Ethos -** The fourth element is of course the exceptional ethos and culture that staff work hard to share and celebrate amongst the tutor groups and teaching classes with whom they come into contact.

This Oaklands Way is not new. We have always been excellent teachers but now we are articulating a specific focus on planning with the quality of thinking in mind, clear communication of learning behaviours along with positive relationships across the school; all within the Catholic setting and supportive of our distinctive ethos. This will leave our young people in no doubt about the strength and quality of their whole education at Oaklands in addition to nurturing the staff to be more successful in their purpose than ever before.

From the Chaplain

Welcome back! I hope that you all had very happy summers, and that wherever your holidays took you and however you spent the long, sunny days you were greatly blessed and refreshed.



It was very exciting to welcome the new Year 7s into the Chapel on their very first day at Oaklands. We sang praise to God, learnt about the Chapel, and why it's so important, and then we spent some time adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. It was wonderful to see so many happy, smiling faces and to learn more about our new pupils. We pray that they will settle quickly into life here at Oaklands; that this will be a place where they will grow and flourish, that their gifts and talents will be nurtured and encouraged, and that they will become all that God has created them to be. I look forward to journeying with them!

We also had a very interesting morning with Year 12, as part of their induction to the Sixth Form. After writing their own 'ethos statement' in the form of their own 10 Commandments, we split into boys and girls. In our separate groups, we discussed a little more about spirituality, delved a little deeper into our identities in Christ, and discussed how our differences are to be celebrated. The boys talked about stepping up and accepting their responsibilities, as well as their need for God in their lives. The girls explored how we are known and intimately loved by God, using the story of the Woman at the Well as an example. There was lively debate as students discussed some of the 'bigger questions'. It was brilliant to see students engaging on a deeper level and considering what faith means to them personally. We finished our morning together in the Chapel, where we spent time in quiet prayer before the Lord in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Students were invited to light a candle and take a piece of scripture away with them. (Our thanks to Niall Farrell, for coming in to lead the boys group).

Wednesday Worship has started during lunchtime. This is a new initiative to encourage students to engage and explore worship; mainly through music, but also through personal prayer, art, dance etc. This is a time to be free to express our joy, love and thanksgiving to God. All are very welcome to come along.

I was fortunate enough to travel with the Diocese to Liverpool at the end of our first week back to 'Adoremus', the National Eucharistic Congress (the first of its kind in over 100 years). I heard some fantastic talks about the importance of Mass and the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. I joined with over 10,000 other Catholics on the Sunday morning for a very wet and windy, but magnificent and very moving Eucharistic Procession led by Cardinal Vincent Nichols (Archbishop of Westminster). As Catholics, we believe that Jesus is really living and present to us in the Blessed Sacrament – what a gift!! We are extremely blessed to have the Blessed Sacrament on site, in our Chapel (and we are forever grateful for our clergy team who make this possible). There are opportunities for Adoration throughout the week, Mondays and Fridays before school, and Monday and Wednesday lunchtime. All are very welcome to pop in and spend some time in prayer.



As we celebrate our School Feast Day, the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, we are reminded that we have freedom and new life through the death and resurrection of Jesus, with the promise of my prayers for this new academic year.



St John's, Korogocho Update

A swe start a new academic year here at Oaklands, St John's are starting their last term of the year. In Kenya, the school calendar runs from January to November. This is an important term for the teachers and students of St John's as they are preparing for the national exams for the end of primary schooling. They are like SATS except that they carry more weight. If a child does not perform well in these exams, they cannot go to secondary school. The rest of the students will also be sitting exams that will determine whether they move on to the next class or they have to re-do the year in the same class.

Fourteen of the pupils who will be sitting their end of primary school national examinations are pupils



who have directly benefitted from this scholarship programme. In other words, if it had not been for this programme, these stuents (9 girls: Mercy, Faith, Ann, Hawa, Joan, Selline, Silvia, Vivian and Purity; and 5 boys: Newton, Daniel, Lawrence, Peter and Wycliff) would not be sitting their exams this year and therefore no chance of going to secondary school and thus greatly limiting their chances of employment.

This year, our St John's Week will be from 8 October to 12 October. We intend to hold many different fundraising activities during this week, so please do support us in whichever way you can. One of the ways you could do this is to sponsor a child as a family. It now costs £45 to send a child to school for a year at St John's. Please talk to your friends and family about this too so that if they are interested, they too can join in. We also hope to have joint lessons and assemblies with the staff and pupils of St John's by Skype – technology permitting!

The Oscar Romero Award

As many of you might be aware, over the last few years Oaklands in partnership with St Thomas More Primary School, St John's Cathedral Primary School, Bishop Challoner Secondary School, St Edmund's Catholic School, St George's College and other organisations like CAFOD and The Romero Trust have been developing The Oscar Romero Award for Schools and Colleges. The aim of this Award is to help schools recognise and celebrate how they put Catholic social teaching in practice as well as challenge them to think about how they can do more to promote social justice in their school community, locally, nationally and internationally.

This Award has three strands (Strategic, Curriculum and Practical) and three levels (Participator, Developer and Innovator). Oaklands, together with the schools mentioned above as well seven other schools in Portsmouth Diocese have achieved the first stage, the Participator Level and are now working towards the Developer Level. Here is a brief description of what each strand at each level is about:



Student Safety

please do not come onto the campus and park before the end of the school day unless you are collecting your child for an appointment and have made prior arrangements with the school. The school gates are closed at 3.00pm each day.

- Try to time your arrival to collect your child at 4.00pm. when you will avoid queues outside the school gates.
- If arriving early before the school gates are opened at 3.50pm, do not park on the zig-zag lines or in the bus bay on Stakes Hill Road.
- Under no circumstances should parents park on the opposite side of Stakes Hill Road in the vicinity of the gates, as this can prevent traffic moving along the main road.
- Only collect your child inside the school grounds, do not meet them on the road outside.
- Drive slowly when on the school campus. The speed limit is 5 mph.
- Do NOT attempt to pick up your child before going around the school roundabout and always park in the designated pick-up area.
- Drive to the furthest point on the pick-up area to maximise the use of this section of roadway. Do NOT park near or on the roundabout.
- Take particular care when pulling out from your parking space – there have been a number of minor bumps over the years.
- Never call your child across the main drive – they must always cross at the designated point near the steps adjacent to Kolbe Block.


Parents are asked to act with courtesy and consideration at all times in the interests of other road users and for the safety of the students when on the school campus.


Towards the end of the year all students were given an assembly on cycle safety. We have an increasing number of students cycling into school and this is to be encouraged. The Local Authority are in the process of improving the cycle network outside school.

Unfortunately, last year a Year 9 student was involved in an accident on his journey to school. Without a cycle helmet he would have sustained serious injury. The school cycle policy has been updated and is available on our website. At the beginning of the year it is worth reinforcing a few points from the policy.

Role of the school:

- 1. To provide a visible place to store the bicycle
- 2. To actively promote cycling as a positive way of travelling.





- 5. The school reserves the right to impound bikes where students use them incorrectly or not in a safe manner whilst on site. This includes disobeying the instruction of site staff, having a bike unfit for road use or not wearing safety equipment including a helmet.
- 6. Fixie type bikes that do not comply with The Pedal Cycles (and Use) Regulations 1983 will be impounded as they are not permitted in school.

Role of the parent:

- While this school wishes to encourage an increase in the number of students cycling to school, we strongly recommend that students wishing to do so are proficient in using a bicycle. More information on the bikeability training syllabus is available at www.bikeability.org.uk
- 2. Check that a student's bike is in roadworthy condition
- Provide the necessary personal safety and protective equipment. Although bicycle helmets are not compulsory on UK roads, it is the school's policy to insist that students wear a cycle helmet.
- The Pedal Cycles (and Use) Regulations 1983 make it clear that every pedal cycle needs two braking systems.
- 5. Parents must ensure that bikes comply with the law.

Behaviour and Standards

A t Oaklands, there are two main ways we encourage our students to move towards self-regulating their behaviour to a high standard; one is through the use of praise and reward, the other is through the use of appropriate sanctions.

EPraise continues to be the main vehicle through which staff can reward students and this year we will be focusing in particular on recognising the effort students put into their work or activities in school, especially where they have showed determination and perseverance. We will award EPraise points in line with our teaching and learningInitiative 'The Oaklands Way' and this half term focus is 'Ready to Learn' so staff will use EPraise as a way of commending students who get it right.

When it comes to sanctions, there are many reasons why a student may receive one but failure to complete homework is a common reason. Students in Year 7 have a phased introduction to homework to ease the transition between primary and secondary school. This ensures students are given the support they need to develop good habits around the completion of homework.

At Oaklands we use 'Additional Learning Opportunities' (ALO's). These are entirely **supportive** and they are set by subject teachers, to be used incrementally to ensure that a student really understands the work and what they have been asked to do. They can be set when a child has not completed homework or not finished work which they could reasonably have been expected to in the lesson.

They can also help remove some of the barriers which prevent a student from not completing work to a level commensurate with their ability. ALOs will be recorded in the student planner. This <u>must</u> be countersigned by parents / carers to acknowledge that their child is being given additional support with their learning and a signature is required for those which need a student to stay after school. There is an expectation at Oaklands that parents / carers will ensure their child attends an ALO as they would want to support their child in overcoming any barriers to learning. There is a clear distinction between ALO's which are supportive and NOT recorded on the school system and detentions, which are a sanction.

If a student fails to take up an ALO or their behaviour necessitates a sanction, again our system ensures an incremental progression.

In all cases, detentions are recorded and detention letters are used to inform parents / carers. Signed slips must be returned to acknowledge the detention and to give consent. Whilst consent to detain a child after school is not legally required, at Oaklands we work hard to maintain good home / school communication and so will continue to ask for the reply slip to be handed in. However, if a child turns up for detention without a slip, all efforts will be made to contact the parent / carer for verbal consent as failure to attend a detention will result in an escalation in sanctions. Again, the expectation is that as parents /carers have signed the home-school agreement, they will support the school's behaviour policy in this regard.

Detentions move swiftly up the scale if there is non-compliance on the part of a student to ensure the matter is resolved within a 2 week timeframe at the most.

Behaviour is very good at Oaklands and standards remain high. This means that overall, we spend more time praising and affirming students than we do sanctioning them. However, this does not happen by chance and we continue to be proactive in maintaining those high standards and seeking ways to work in conjunction with parents and carers to ensure that is the case. Our systems are regularly reviewed to ensure we are maintaining the correct balance with reward and sanction.

Thank you for the support you give in making the Home School agreement a working document in support of the standards we strive to maintain at Oaklands.

Restorative Justice

You may be aware that last academic year we introduced 'The Oaklands Way' (see page 8), this was to help ensure outstanding Teaching and Learning was consistent across the school. It encourages students to 'Think Hard' and teachers to use a 'Shared Language' that everyone understands so that there is parity and consistency across the curriculum. 'The Oaklands Way' then helped us to develop our unique culture and ethos.

We had a 'Half Term Focus' on a variety of things such as 'Playing By The Rules' and 'The Golden Rule'. This enabled us to celebrate what makes our school unique and reward students for their contribution.

This year we are building 'Restorative Justice' into 'The Oaklands Way'. Restorative Justice is based on four key features:

RESPECT: for everyone by listening to other opinions and learning to value them

RESPONSIBILITY: taking responsibility for your own actions

REPAIR: developing the skills within our school community so that its individual

members have the necessary skills to identify solutions that repair harm and

ensure behaviours are not repeated

RE-INTEGRATION: working through a structured, supportive process that aims to solve the

problem and be happy and safe in school.

We want to ensure all our young people participate actively in their learning and in school life. We acknowledge that sometimes we make mistakes, we get it wrong, but we want to move away from being quick to sanction but instead try and work with our young people to evaluate and reflect on what went wrong and what needs to happen in order to put it right through a Restorative Justice process.

This year if there is an incident students will be asked six questions to help them reflect. These six questions encourage students to think about how they feel, how others have been affected and what needs to be done in order to put the situation right. If they engage in this process than we can avoid sanctions and ensure that all people affected feel a sense of fairness and justice.



There have already been many successes and both staff and student feedback on this process has been very positive. We have had fewer incidents that have resulted in a sanction and students are being encouraged to self-regulate and adapt their own behaviour to create a positive and productive learning environment.

Attendance Matters

Oaklands attendance figures for 2017-2018 were 94.3% which was a disappointing dip below our target of 96% and was in part due to an increase in families taking children out of school for unauthorised holidays.

We are pleased that the vast majority of our parents and students recognise the value of good attendance at school and appreciate that there is a correlation between high attendance rates with exam success. We are grateful when parents maintain good home school communication and report absences in a timely fashion as this is both a statutory and a safeguarding requirement for us; to know why students are not in school and to account for all students who are late into school and to code accordingly.



Oaklands has sadly not been immune to the national trend of more families applying for holidays in term time or in some cases, parents taking their children out of school for holidays without notification or authorisation.

Please do take the time to read the guidance on our website (via Parents/Attendance link), which is from Hampshire County Council's Guidance for Parents and on which our Registration and Attendance Policy is based.

In brief, 95% attendance is the **minimum** we expect at Oaklands (except in the case of genuine medical cases or significant personal issues which will be known to Heads of Year). 90% attendance, which to many sounds like an acceptable figure, actually equates to half a day a week of school missed across a 40 week school year. There aren't many employers who would be satisfied with a 90% attendance rate at work and so we aspire to attendance excellence at Oaklands and will continue to recognise and reward high attendance as well as follow the attached guidance in the case of poor attendance.

Please can I ask that you ensure all the contact details we hold for you are up to date so that we can contact you without delay if a lateness or absence needs to be clarified with you. The latest guidance for schools is that we hold at least two emergency contacts for your child; if that is currently not the case, please do let us have a second contact and Business Support will be in contact asking for this information.

<u>Procedure for Reporting your Child's Absence from School</u> (for students in Year 7 to 11 only)

- Parents must telephone the school using the Attendance number 02392 248053 to report the first day of your child's absence by 8.30am. If you cannot get through on the Attendance number, please call 02392 259214.
- Alternatively parents can email the absence to absence@oaklandscatholicschool.org (leaving a contact number on the email for verification purposes).
- When the child returns to school either the child brings a note to give to their Form Tutor or the parent sends an email if they haven't already done so to <u>absence@oaklandscatholicschool.org</u> reporting the date(s) and reason for absence. They can also reply via the Keep Kids Safe texting service if they have received a text previously regarding their child's absence.

Leave of absence forms (for the purpose of exceptional circumstances only) can be obtained from main Reception/Student Services or from the website and should be returned to Student Services for authorisation by Mrs Oldroyd.

Reminders

Visiting School

Oaklands is an orderly safe place, where relationships between staff and visitors, especially parents/carers, demonstrate mutual respect and recognition of shared responsibility for pupils' welfare and educational progress. Parental involvement is an important factor for a successful education and in dealing with emerging problems at an early stage.

If you need to come into school please ring ahead and book an appointment. It is not appropriate just to 'turn up' and demand to see a member of the teaching or support staff.

On occasion, the behaviour of a few parents/carers has caused severe disruption or worse, resulting in abusive or aggressive behaviour towards staff, pupils, or other members of the school community.

The governors are responsible for protecting the health and safety of their staff and pupils. Behaviour which includes abusive or threatening language, inappropriate demeanour or invasion of personal space against school staff or other members of the school community will not be tolerated. All members of the Oaklands community have a right to expect that the school is a safe place in which to work and learn. There is no place for inappropriate threatening behaviour or abuse in schools.

Where such an incident does occur, the governors will play a proactive role in taking all possible action to deal with it. Day to day access to a school is within the control of the Headteacher.

Parking

A reminder to parents who are collecting and dropping off their children at school mornings and afternoons; please do not block driveways, park on the white lines or double yellow lines or grass verges in local residential areas such as Durham Gardens, Place Crescent, Shaftesbury Avenue and Lombardy Rise. It is important that consideration is given to residents who live in these areas around the school.

Contact Details

Parents are asked to ensure that any change of contact details are communicated to the school as soon as possible to enable us to keep our records up to date. This includes changes to other family members or friends who are listed as back-up emergency contacts. Thank you.

Free School Meal Declaration

If any child is adopted from care, they may be eligible for additional support in school through the pupil premium+ funding. Parents can contact Mrs Oldroyd in confidence to self—declare if this is the case, providing evidence of the court papers.

School Reports

If you are a parent who requires a duplicate copy of school reports please can you contact your child's Head of Year.

Our SIMS system does not allow us to have two 'priority 1' contact details so we hold a register of any family when such a request is made to ensure all parents and carers can obtain their child's report in a timely manner.

Medicines in School

Parents are reminded that if their children have or develop medical conditions, they should complete a Health Care Form. In addition, if students have regular prescribed medication, ie epipens or inhalers, parents should complete an Administration of Medication Form. Both forms are available to download from our website and should be returned to Student Services.
