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From the Headteacher's Desk

After a few months away, a welcome return to the Oaklands News; a sign that a little normality is returning.

There are a number of historic events outside of family life that remain locked in my memory. I recall the Queen's Silver Jubilee, Princess Diana's funeral, the maiden shuttle flight and there are others. I am sure you will have your own list. One reason for remembering these events in our lives is the amount of emotion we invest in them. We are more likely to recall what happened at Christmas when family and friends surround us, than we are to remember what happened on the way to work. Anniversaries also help to fix memories because they have more emotional significance than other days.

One event that is also fixed for me is the first visit of Barack Obama to the UK which happened in March 2009. He arrived at Stansted complete with armoured limousines, helicopters and a mass of high-tech security equipment, including the Presidential limousine, known as 'The Beast'. Many people, including me, were wondering if he was 'the one', he had a political style that was refreshingly dignified, something that had been missing for a while in politics. I remember the words of a BBC reporter who described him as, "The man in whom so many people have invested their hopes and dreams at this difficult time in world affairs."

On Sunday we celebrated Palm Sunday, the beginning of one of the most momentous weeks in history. So many people had invested their hopes and dreams in Jesus at this difficult time. There was Jesus on a donkey and a large crowd of Passover visitors took palm branches and went down the road to meet him. They shouted, "Praise God! Blessings on the one who comes in the name of the LORD! Hail to the King of Israel!"

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of what is called Passion Week, by the time you read this it will almost be over. It is referred to as Passion Week because of the emotional and physical suffering Jesus went through on our behalf demonstrating His great love for us.

The suffering and love Jesus has for us is not something that we just reflect on one week out of the year. Rather it is something, like those historic memories, where an emotional attachment needs to remain with us throughout our lives, because what Jesus did then needs to be reflected in how we live our lives now.



Thank you to all of our Oaklands school community for a very successful return from lockdown. Attendance has been good and our students have followed all the safety guidance. I have visited lots of lessons and have seen all the students wearing masks, well ventilated rooms and some excellent learning taking place.

Our in-school lateral flow tests were a success with very high rates of participation. Students have taken home their testing kits and should now complete these twice a week. I am grateful to parents for supporting this. Please remember to ensure your children log the results with the NHS and with the school through Test Register. If you need any help with this then please contact your child's Form tutor. Please see the information further in.

I am also grateful for the support parents have given with uniform. Our students are always well presented, and we want to keep this going. They may wear a coat over their blazer in class if it is cold. This does need to be a coat, as we do not allow hoodies or sweatshirts. They should also wear their school jumper under their blazer. If they are missing any items, then the Easter holidays are a good chance to replace them. Please contact us if you need any help with this. Information about uniform and our supplier can be found on the school website.

School will close at the usual time on Thursday 1st April for the Easter Holidays and reopen on Monday 19th April. Information related to COVID contacts can be found further in.

I hope you are able to enjoy some family time together before we begin our Summer term.

Lateral Flow Test Centre

Staff and volunteers at Oaklands carried out over 4,000 lateral flow tests in the first few weeks of this half term, the manner in which students took part in the tests was a deciding factor in making that effort a success.

Everyone involved with administering the tests was required to take and pass a series of online assessments before taking part. The commitment of both staff and volunteers was extraordinary. Some came in on their days off and offered to do extra sessions to help ensure we had all the required slots covered.

The school gym was converted into our Test Centre with the necessary social distancing and hygiene measures. The whole testing process kept to time and by the end of the second week back all students requiring a test had been through.

Facilities remain on site should a student be required to test at school.



Lateral Flow Home Testing

All students have now been provided with sufficient COVID-19 home testing kits to continue the twice weekly tests over the Easter holiday.

We have had an excellent return rate through the Test Register and results need to continue to be submitted by 7.00pm on Wednesdays and Sundays over the holidays and into next term.

Over Easter, we are responsible for track and trace so it is important that parents ensure we are informed of all test results. Please use Test Register to record results. If there are any issues with logging a result with Test Register,

please email the results to **covidtest@oaklandscatholicschool.org** stating your child's name and tutor group and if the test was positive, negative or void.

All the information previously communicated regarding home testing still applies and can be viewed on the school website.

It is important that students continue to register tests both with the school and the NHS through Test Register and thank you for your support in helping us achieve such a high return rate.

Track and Trace Over the Holiday

Over the Easter holiday the school has a responsibility to trace COVID-19 cases up until 7 April. In reality, this means that if a student or member of staff tested positive up to and including Saturday 3 April, the school would have to notify families of those students who had been in school if their child was a close contact.

The table below follows the current DfE guidance where schools are asked to look at the two day period before the day of a positive Lateral Flow Test or a positive PCR Test. If a child records a positive Lateral Flow Test, they then need to book a PCR test. If a PCR test is negative, then isolation ends.


Over Easter, if you suspect your child has COVID-19, please do not wait for the next occasion for their Lateral Flow Test, but instead, book a PCR test as quickly as possible and notify the school by emailing **provision@oaklandscatholicschool.org**.

Please contact us again, using the same email, as soon as the test results are known. We need to know if the result is positive or negative, for our records.

If we are notified of a confirmed case, we will contact parents as required using the email and texting service.

Please do not use any other telephone numbers, email addresses or contacts, apart from the Provision email, as this is the only one which will be monitored for COVID-19 results over the holidays between 2 and 18 April.

Please do not delay in providing us with any of the information requested.

News from the Sixth Form

A s Year 13 begin their mini mocks in preparation for their final eight weeks at Oaklands, we are working with Year 12 students to identify the next steps towards their post-18 destinations.

Without the advantages of the usual wealth of work experience opportunities to help students determine if a particular venue is for them, it has been tricky for some to show their worth to potential admissions officers at universities or even to potential employers. However, as usual some of our clever young people have found a way to be successful in gaining key competencies and experiences, never mind a national lockdown!



We share opportunities for students through Microsoft Teams and some of the brilliant new ways of accessing important career choices are described below:

MOOCS – Massive Open Online Courses. These are usually free or low cost and are offered by universities as a way of showing your abilities beyond A Level. Students have selected this option as part of their enrichment choices and they work on them in their own time. Courses can last two, three or even ten weeks and have post A Level syllabus components.

Summer Schools – many universities are still open for applications for this summer's events. Go to the university website to see what they are offering.

Unifrog https://www.unifrog.org/ - in Oaklands Sixth Form we use a brilliant careers website, for which all students have a log in. They can take careers quizzes, research university courses anywhere in the world, find apprenticeship opportunities, learn how to construct their UCAS personal statements, record all tutor interactions and interviews so that they can see their progress through the two years in Sixth Form.

Whilst we may have lost out on personal contact, the tutorial support for Sixth Formers has, as ever, been excellent. We have missed our Year 12 during lockdown, but know that if they follow up on the opportunities offered they will be at the front of the queue in the Autumn as they start to research and make university and apprenticeship applications.

Behaviour and Standards

At Oaklands, there are two main ways we encourage our students to move towards self-regulating their behaviour to a high standard; one is through the use of praise and reward, the other is through the use of restorative justice and appropriate sanctions.

EPraise continues to be the main vehicle through which staff can reward students and this year we will be focusing in particular on recognising the effort students put into their work or activities in school, especially where they have showed determination and perseverance. We will award EPraise points in line with our teaching and learning initiative 'The Oaklands Way' so staff will use EPraise as a way of commending students who exemplify this.

When it comes to sanctions, there are many reasons why a student may receive one but failure to complete homework is a common reason. Students in Year 7 have a phased introduction to homework to ease the transition between primary and secondary school. This ensures students are given the support they need to develop good habits around the completion of homework. Due to the current

restrictions around bubbles, each Year Group will have a centralised detention one day a week. Therefore we cannot accommodate requests to move or changes the day a detention is set. Year 7 DT's will take place on a Monday, Year 8 on Tuesday, Year 9 on Wednesday, Year 10 on Thursday and Year 11 on Friday. Some department detentions may vary but they will still ensure they only have one year group in at a time.

In all cases, detentions are recorded and detention letters are used to inform parents / carers. Signed slips must be returned to acknowledge the detention and to give consent. Whilst consent to detain a child after school is not legally required, at Oaklands we work hard to maintain good home / school communication and so will continue to ask for the reply slip to be handed in. However, if a child turns up for detention without a slip, all efforts will be made to contact the parent / carer for verbal consent as failure to attend a detention will result in an escalation in sanctions. Again, the expectation is that as parents /carers have signed the home-school agreement, they will support the school's behaviour policy in this regard.

Detentions move swiftly up the scale if there is non-compliance on the part of a student to ensure the matter is resolved within a two week timeframe at the most.

Behaviour is very good at Oaklands and standards remain high. This means that overall, we spend more time praising and affirming students than we do sanctioning them. However, this does not happen by chance and we continue to be proactive in maintaining those high standards and seeking ways to work in conjunction with parents and carers to ensure that is the case. Our systems are regularly reviewed to ensure we are maintaining the correct balance with reward and sanction.

Thank you for the support you give in making the Home School agreement a working document in support of the standards we strive to maintain at Oaklands.

From the Chair of Governors

As we head into the Easter break, I reflect on this term which has been perhaps the most challenging I've known during my long history with Oaklands as a parent and a Governor. It has also been mixed with sadness, anxiety, incredible fortitude, unyielding positivity and wonderful selflessness.

The year started with the tragic news about Freddie Fincham, a wonderful young man in Year 9, taken from his family and friends far too soon. More recently an alumni, Bradley Coombes, lost his fight to cancer at the all too young age of just 23. Elsewhere in our staff community, Mrs Nicky Harvey sadly lost her husband Stephen after a period of illness. Our thoughts and prayers are with them and their families at this incredibly sad and difficult time; as they are also to all others who have suffered bereavements in recent months.



For the year to start with students returning to classrooms only for the Prime Minister to close all schools within a day has understandably increased pressure on families, generated anxiety and tested the patience, resilience and mental fortitude of everyone in our community. I am completely in awe of the way our staff, at every level, have rallied in support of the students. To juggle the responsibilities of their own caring and home-schooling commitments whilst concurrently delivering educational support across all year groups has been nothing short of incredible. On behalf of the Governors, and on behalf of you all, I'd like to thank each and every one of them – from Mr Quinn and his Senior Leadership Team, right through every Head of Year, Head of Department and every member of teaching and support staff, "Thank you, you have been amazing."

Then as we again returned to the classrooms, the volunteers from all corners of our community who stepped up to help deliver the lateral flow testing, without which we could not have allowed students back, was a selfless act – not an easy thing to do, but one they did willingly to allow the school to function as effectively as it has been over the past weeks. Again I thank all volunteers, your efforts are truly appreciated.

When we return after Easter we will have much to look forward to. Not only will the further easing of COVID-19 restrictions and continued vaccination roll-out combined with longer, warmer days start to shift everyone's mood into something far more positive, but we can also look to grow in our Catholic education community. On 1 April, Corpus Christi Catholic Primary School will join Oaklands in the Edith Stein Catholic Academy Trust, the first school to do so since our own academy conversion in September 2011. We already have strong ties with the school, as we do with all schools in the Edith Stein Partnership, but it is a very significant moment to expand the Academy Trust and we very much look forward to welcoming all staff and students into the Trust and working with them more formally. As the Trust grows, so governance will adapt to meet renewed responsibilities. The Trust Board (The Directors) will change shape and cease to wholly comprise Oaklands Governors. There will be no change to the roles and responsibilities of the Local Governing Body, although we shall see some changes as Governors come to the end of their term of office. I would therefore like to take this opportunity to again invite any practising Catholics who believe that they have skills that will be of use in the governance of Oaklands to consider offering their services as a Foundation Governor. More details can be provided upon request and Mr Quinn and I are always happy to meet with anyone who might be interested.

I wish you all a very happy and safe Easter and, as the various restrictions ease next term, look forward to seeing more of you in person at Oaklands in the Summer Term.

A nother year passes, and another Lent in lockdown. Perhaps we are all getting just a small taste of what it was like for Moses and the Israelites wandering in the desert for forty years, desperately searching and waiting for the Promised Land. We've grumbled and moaned, we've looked for answers, we've tried to find the way; I'm sure we've even doubted God or asked why He has seemingly left us in this wilderness for so long now! The Israelites didn't have a "roadmap", like ours from the PM, but they had God with them day and night; He never abandoned His people.

Perhaps the mundane monotony of lockdown reminds us of the lockdown we place upon ourselves through sin; we repeatedly make the same mistakes, we hurt others, we turn away from God, and we get lost wandering in our own desert of shortcomings and failures. Year 13 CREST Awards

Since September 2019, A Level Chemistry students have been working on projects to achieve CREST awards. The process has been disrupted to school closure due to the Coronavirus pandemic but students remained committed and have reaped the rewards with confirmation of their CREST award classifications and the arrival of certificates in February and March this year.

Oaklands Chemistry students were part of a project, funded by the Gatsby Foundation, which explored the benefits of STEM activities, specifically CREST awards in this case, on the engagement with and understanding of A Level Science curriculum. Guided by teachers and with support from the lab technician and staff from Gatsby and The British Science Association, students started by synthesising Aspirin from Oil of Wintergreen. This allowed students to become more confident with the more complex laboratory glassware and techniques that they might not come across at such an early stage in their academic careers.

Students then formed small teams and chose suitable investigation projects, linked to the Aspirin synthesis. They had to complete research and then justify their method ensuring it could be linked to a real-life application; examples include investigating different acid catalysts and investigating effect of pH on permeability of Aspirin through a partially permeable membrane. Students completed between 40-70 hours of work, with class work, laboratory sessions in free time and research/write up out of school. They have developed excellent analytical skills, team working skills and report writing skills, to name a few.

Half of the class submitted and achieved Gold CREST awards, the highest standard available, and the remaining students achieved Silver CREST awards, another difficult level to reach. In some cases, the project write-up has also been used to obtain EPQ qualifications, all useful for UCAS/apprenticeship/job applications.

The CREST award projects have provided a fantastic enrichment opportunity and it is something that the Science department hope to do again. Here are some quotations from some of the students who participated:

'I am glad that the school has given us the opportunity to complete this award. As a student, I spent the majority of my academic years watching my teachers perform complex lab experiments, so designing and planning our own was an exciting prospect. We conducted many amazing chemical reactions during the award and spent many hours obtaining results and writing our project reports; our certificate is the culmination of all of our hard work, and will be very useful evidence for applications.'

'Carrying out this investigation has taught me a lot more about this particular field of chemistry. My background research into the chemistry, uses, and history of aspirin has given me a much larger breadth of knowledge about how aspirin works in the body, the changes that have been made to aspirin since it was first discovered and the multiple different uses for aspirin in today's society. Furthermore, this investigation taught me about the multiple different factors that must be considered when medicines are being developed on an industrial scale; not only does the quality of the product matter, but also the economical side of it. In my opinion, the most beneficial thing that I have learnt from this investigation, is how to execute practical skills more professionally and efficiently. Additionally, this project allowed me to enhance my ability to work as a team, a skill which will be very beneficial to me in the future.'

'Completing the Crest award has provided me with many opportunities and skills I would need in the future such as teamwork, organisation skills to planning and write-ups. Visualizing the process behind the synthesis of aspirin for my gold crest award qualification in chemistry motivated me to choose Pharmacy (Mpharm) at university to study. Synthesizing aspirin showed me the simplicity in manufacturing such a commonly used drug. I was very fortunate to take part in this opportunity and through this, the biggest lesson learnt is to keep going as it's all worth it in the end as I've had to overcome challenges to reach the gold level'

In addition, my research into aspirin has widened my knowledge about how the drug works and the changes that have been made to aspirin since it was first discovered. Alongside this, I have also been able to enhance my ability to work as a team which will be important in the future.'

Opportunity for Year 9 Students

8 Places at a Virtual Summer School

Oaklands will be hosting a STEM event by Seafarers UK for some Year 9 students, and as part of this, we have been offered 8 (4 boy, 4 girl) fully funded summer school places with Southampton University.

The summer school will take place from 2nd to 4th August 2021, 10am to 4pm each day. Students will participate from home with virtual instructions and support and all equipment needed will be posted home in advance.

This course would normally cost £200 per student.

The University of Southampton invites you to explore the fascinating world of Future Marine Engineering, and to experience the challenge of innovative design for the maritime environment. The course is hosted by the Maritime Engineering Group within the Civil, Maritime and Environmental Engineering Department, which is home of the largest university-based towing tank in the UK and the National Infrastructure Laboratory.

Through this course you will learn what it takes to design ships, renewable energy technologies, and remotely controlled systems. You will face the challenges of manoeuvring your ship in stormy sea states, optimising ship propulsion and operating underwater vehicles. You will also have the chance to talk to talented young engineers and researchers, who are directly involved across the maritime frontier, from world class sailing competitions to building the vehicles which dwell in the unexplored abysses of our planet.



Uniform

Getting the basics right with uniform is a good indicator of a student's level of commitment, co-operation and a sense of pride about being part of the school community. Our staff work hard to uphold the rules regarding uniform and we would be very grateful if you could reiterate those rules at home and check that they leave the house looking smart.

We are going to insist on high standards of uniform after Easter now we have settled back into the routine of school. There will be regular uniform checks in tutor time and parents will be contacted if full and correct uniform is not being worn. As previously, if you have any specific issues around uniform please contact your child's form tutor in the first instance.

Please refer to our website for more information about Skoolkit opening hours and online ordering service.

- **Blazers** are compulsory and must be worn to and from school. Please ensure your son/ daughter is wearing it correctly when they leave the house (and it is not rolled up in their bag).
- Jumpers are optional in the summer term due to warmer weather. A trend in the wearing of the
 female jumper has developed girls have taken to tucking their jumpers into their skirts. This is
 not acceptable and they will be asked to untuck it. Please ensure they leave the home without
 their jumper tucked in.
- Boys' Trousers should be navy blue, formal tailored trousers. Skinny fit / super skinny fit trousers are not acceptable. Slim fit are acceptable. Parents are warned NOT to buy cotton mix chino style trousers as you will be asked to replace them.
- Skirts should be navy blue, with sewn down pleats all around. We face an ever-present battle
 with our female students regarding the length of their skirts. Many girls roll up their waistbands
 and this results in skirt lengths which are not appropriate for a mixed learning environment.
 Please help us to help you buy sufficiently long skirts, check the waistband before the girls
 leave home. We will insist that they roll them down.
- **Shoes** students are required to wear black flat proper shoes; girls' heels should be no more than two inches. There has been a recent fashion of students wearing canvas casual shoes or <u>leather trainers / trainer style shoes</u> this is not acceptable and contravenes the uniform regulations and has health and safety implications due to the type of sole. The shoes should be leather, not suede.
- Coats for inclement weather, parents may purchase a plain (without logo) appropriate school
 coat, preferably navy or black to be worn over the blazer. Denim, leather or leather look jackets
 are not acceptable. Hoodies/sweatshirts/ gilets are forbidden and not considered an
 acceptable item of school uniform. Non-uniform items of clothing which are repeatedly worn into
 school despite verbal warnings will be confiscated.
- **Scarves** should be in appropriate school colours and not linked to any football team. Students will be asked to remove any non-regulation item of uniform.
- Cosmetics makeup, false tan, nail varnish/Shellac/ artificial nails are all prohibited. Staff have been equipped with cleansers/removers and students will be ordered to remove these forms of cosmetics.
 - Given the current hygiene requirements, nails should be kept as short as possible to aid good hand washing technique.
- **Jewellery** students are permitted to wear a simple cross and chain, a watch and ONE pair of plain stud earrings in the LOBE. Other body piercings, ie nose, eyebrow, tongue, bellybutton, upper ear are not permitted and students will be ordered to remove them. Items which do not conform to our regulations will be confiscated.
 - Please note that if a student gets their ears pierced during term time they will be asked to remove them for PE for health and safety reasons; we can no longer allow students to tape them up. Refusal to remove them will result in an after school detention. We advise getting any piercing done at the start of the summer holidays to avoid any issues.

Hair - exaggerated, coloured, or bleached hairstyles are not acceptable at Oaklands. This
includes beading and extreme colouring/highlights. Excessively long and excessively short hair
styles are considered exaggerated and are not acceptable. Hair must not hide the face – all
features must be visible. Long hair must be tied up for PE. For parents' guidance, boys' haircuts
should be of no less than a <u>Grade 2</u> on any part of the head. All boys should be clean
shaven. Hair accessories must be navy, royal blue or white.

SANCTIONS:

- Verbal warning to correct uniform
- Email home to parents with a warning that if no improvement next step will be uniform monitoring
- Student placed in uniform monitoring
- If there is no improvement a detention DT will be set and uniform monitoring will be extended for a further two week period
- If there is still no improvement a student will be set an SLT extended detention
- If student fails to correct their uniform following these interventions, a Fixed Period Exclusion will be put in place for 'Persistent Disruptive Behaviour'.

News from St John's, Korogocho

The last period of lockdown was fraught with difficulty and challenge for all. However, students and staff were better equipped to tackle the online world of teaching and learning; adjusting our lives to regular Teams calls and assignments, in a way none of us would have ever imagined possible. Support with heating costs, for families facing Winter hardship due to COVID-19



Information for Parents and Carers

As part of the connect4communities programme, the Citizens Advice Service is helping families and individuals with energy costs over the winter period – gas, electric and water.

The COVID Winter Grant scheme has been extended to 16 April, meaning this help is available for a few more weeks.

Please note that the local branch will complete a quick eligibility check and refer parents and carers to the distributors of the grant and financial support will be provided to the family or individual seeking help.

The eligibility criteria for this support - to heat homes - is wide-ranging to ensure the money is as accessible as possible and is as follows:

Families with children:

- Families in receipt of benefits related free school meals
- Families including 16-18-year olds previously eligible for Free School Meals
- All children with a social worker
- All children open to Early Help
- All households with 2 4year olds accessing childcare and eligible for Early Years Pupil Premium
- Households with a young carer
- Those who it is believed will struggle to afford to heat their home adequately and/or maintain a reasonable standard of living this winter

Households without children:

- Care leavers
- Households that have been identified as going into debt for the first time
- Households or individuals with no other way of obtaining funds, e.g. those who face choosing to pay either rent or bills (considered unmanageable debt)
- Those who it is believed will struggle to afford to heat their home adequately and/or maintain a reasonable standard of living this winter

Support from this fund, distributed by the Citizens Advice Service, can take the form of:

Pre-paid energy cards or the payment of a fuel bill on behalf of an eligible household
