

From the Headteacher's Desk

Welcome to this edition of the Oaklands News and a Happy, if not belated, New Year to you all. I hope everyone had a restful holiday after a busy Autumn term.

There comes a time in all our lives when it dawns on us that we are not as young as we used to be. The turning of a New Year is a reminder of this; whereas the future once seemed to stretch out for eternity, suddenly it appears all too short. The time left to fulfil our dreams is far less than we thought.

The other day I was looking at the applications to join our Year 7 in September 2023. It suddenly dawned on me that some of the youngsters were born after the 2012 Olympics, a moment in the country's history that only feels, to me, like yesterday. I have pieces of clothing older than some of our younger students!

It is easy to be maudlin about the passing of time. One antidote is to make a resolution; an attempt to do something to better yourself or the lives of another. It is in positively changing the life of another that our influence lives on.

The Gospel of Jesus Christ is about new beginnings, a fresh start, not of our own making but by the grace of God . School Council

One of my work based resolutions for this year is to involve students more in school life and learning. Earlier this year we 'rebooted' our school council and I hope that this will become the vehicle to effect change in school. I have already met with a representative group to talk about how students use the school toilet facilities and the improvements we could make. More information will follow on this issue later in the term.

Punctuality

I undertake duty on the school gate a few times a week. The vast majority of students arrive to school on time, however there are a significant number of walkers and those being dropped off by car who are late to school. Nearly all of our students manage to get here on time, please don't allow your child to be one of those few who fall behind because of poor punctuality.

Attendance

Last term our attendance rates were significantly above the national average. However, the national average post-COVID is lower than it has ever been, so there remains lots of room for improvement. Last term was not helped by concerns about Strep A, there were also a number of other vicious 'bugs' circulating in the wider community. We continue to receive guidance from the DfE on respiratory illness. Obviously, there is a lot of illness circulating and the system is under immense pressure, however our students have missed quite enough over the last few years and they need to be in school. If they are well enough to learn, they need to be here.

University Success

Congratulations to all students in Year 13 who have sent their applications to the University and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) well before the deadline and have been receiving offers from their universities of choice. This year we have a record number of university hopefuls who have been receiving offers from some of the most prestigious universities in the country.

We again wish every student in the Oaklands Sixth Form College the best of luck in their remaining interviews, Spring examinations and the final stages of their A Level courses. Enormous thanks and congratulations also go to the Sixth Form tutors for their preparation of references and support for personal statements

Finally, at the beginning of a new term it is important that the school gets back to its normal rhythm as quickly as possible and students continue to deliver the high standards that you and we expect.

Remembering Pope Benedict XVI

Attendance

Please can you ensure that if your child is absent from school that you notify the school <u>before 8.00am or as soon after that time as you can</u>. It is a requirement that parents notify the school when their child is absent and to state the reason for that absence with an indication on the first day as to whether it is likely to be a longer term absence.

Parents can communicate via one of the following ways:

- By email to <u>absence@oaklandscatholicschool.org</u> (leaving a contact number on the email for verification purposes).
- By phone using the main school number 02392 259214 and selecting

 By phone using the Absence Line 02392 248053
 These numbers automatically go to voicemail and you will need to leave a message stating your child's name, Tutor Group and the reason for their absence. If you require a call back, then please say so in the message and the Attendance Manager will get back to you.
- By text to 07943 104534
- Via ClassCharts

You can leave a message using any of these methods as soon as you know your child will be absent from school.

In line with the school's safeguarding procedures, it is important that all students are accounted for each day. It may therefore be necessary for the Attendance Manager to contact you during the morning for clarification of absence.

Any absence of five days or more must be supported by medical evidence (eg. letter from GP or consultant, copy of the appointment card, prescription, named and dated medicine etc). Evidence will also be required for any student whose attendance is below 90%.

If the absence is planned, eg. for a medical or other off-site appointment, please let us know in advance to ensure that your child is not delayed in being signed out of school. Students leaving must sign out at the Attendance Window. An adult must contact the school in advance of collection with a reason for absence. Without this, students will not be permitted to leave the school site.

Students should always come to the Attendance Window to sign in if they are arriving after 9.00am (please do not go straight to registration or assembly). Any students returning during the day from an appointment should also ensure they sign back in at the Attendance Window, even if it is during break or lunchtime.

Holiday requests and requests for absences (eg. for music exams, college interviews etc) must be made on the correct Leave of Absence Form so that they can be coded accurately. This form is available on the school website via this link <u>Oaklands Catholic School Application for Leave of Absence</u>.

Holidays will not be approved unless there are exceptional circumstances.



Punctuality

Students who are late to school or lessons will be given a lunchtime detention to pay those minutes back. If a student is late to lessons, the class teacher will add these to ClassCharts; these will be totalled and students will then be set sanctions at either lunch time or after school.

Every term the late minutes data is analysed and we will write home to parents of the most persistent latecomers.

Detentions

All parents know that from time to time youngsters step the wrong side of the line. With good parenting comes the responsibility for setting clear boundaries and, where necessary, taking action when these are pushed. In school one of the sanctions we have at our disposal is a detention, which can occur during or after school, on Inset days or Saturday mornings.

With both in and after school detentions, the 2011 Education Act, in addition to giving schools the power to search students and sanction students for behaviour outside of school, **states that parental consent is not required for detentions** and detentions outside school hours can be issued on the same day.

Whilst the law is quite unambiguous, at Oaklands we are aware that for some students transport to and from school creates issues for same day detentions. In most circumstances parents will be given advanced notice of a pending detention via ClassCharts. However, in the final analysis, if a parent does not agree to a detention then the sanction can escalate to the point where a youngster is excluded. I am sure all parents would want to avoid this.

Finally, if you do receive a detention notification on ClassCharts for your child, please remind them of their responsibility to attend the detention as directed.

If you are not logged into ClassCharts, then please contact your child's Form Tutor as you will be missing vital notifications and information.

Uniform

he long dark nights and cold weather mean it's time to turn our thoughts to what our students are wearing. We ask you to help us maintain high uniform standards by supporting the uniform rules:

- Shoes students are required to wear black flat proper shoes; girls' heels should be no more than two inches. There has been a recent fashion of students wearing canvas casual shoes or <u>leather</u> <u>trainers / trainer style shoes</u> this is not acceptable and contravenes the uniform regulations and has health and safety implications due to the type of sole. The shoes should be leather, not suede.
- Coats for inclement weather, parents may purchase a plain (without logo) appropriate school coat, preferably navy or black to be worn over the blazer. Denim, leather or leather look jackets are not acceptable. Hoodies and sweatshirts are forbidden and not considered an acceptable item of school uniform. Non-uniform items of clothing which are repeatedly worn into school despite verbal warnings will be confiscated.
- **Scarves** should be in appropriate school colours and not linked to any football team. Students will be asked to remove any non-regulation item of uniform.
- **Cosmetics** <u>makeup, false tan, nail varnish/Shellac/ artificial nails are all prohibited</u>. Staff have been equipped with cleansers/removers and students will be ordered to remove these forms of cosmetics. *Given the current hygiene requirements, nails should be kept as short as possible to aid good hand washing technique.*
- **Jewellery** students are permitted to wear a simple cross and chain, a watch and ONE pair of plain stud earrings in the LOBE. Other body piercings, ie nose, eyebrow, tongue, bellybutton, upper ear are not permitted and students will be ordered to remove them. Items which do not conform to our regulations will be confiscated.

Please note that if a student gets their ears pierced during term time they will be asked to remove them for PE for health and safety reasons; we can no longer allow students to tape them up. Refusal to remove them will result in an after school detention. We advise getting any piercing done at the start of the summer holidays to avoid any issues.

 Hair - exaggerated, coloured, or bleached hairstyles are not acceptable at Oaklands. This includes beading and extreme colouring/highlights. Excessively long and excessively short hair styles are considered exaggerated and are not acceptable. Hair must not hide the face – all features must be visible. Long hair must be tied up for PE.

For parents' guidance, boys' haircuts should be of no less than a <u>Grade 2</u> on any part of the head. All boys should be clean shaven. Hair accessories must be navy, royal blue or white.

SANCTIONS:

- Verbal warning to correct uniform- this will be logged on ClassCharts
- If there are three logs for poor or incorrect uniform in one week a Wednesday after school detention will be set
- Student placed in uniform monitoring
- If there is still no improvement a student will be set an SLT extended detention

Your co-operation in ensuring full and correct uniform is critical in maintaining the high standards expected at Oaklands.

Student Leadership at Oaklands

E ducation in a Catholic school is not just education for the sake of it; rather it is for **enabling young people to acquire skills necessary to live life in a certain way**. This means that at Oaklands, we aim to motivate young people to become people of challenge, change and transformation;

- Challenge: to be unafraid and unashamed to challenge anything which denigrates or belittles a person; to see every person as a brother or sister made in the image and likeness of God
 Change: to be advected for abando where it is peeded
- **Change**: to be advocates for change where it is needed
- Transformation: to be personally transformed, and through that transformation, work to create a world of justice and peace for all

This year, we have embarked on a new style and structure for student leadership that we believe will support our students to become instruments of challenge, change and transformation. This leadership structure will allow students to be actively involved in the everyday life of the school, thus allowing them to develop personally as well as making the school a good place for all of us.

To be able to achieve this, we have adopted an extended student leadership headed by a President and Senior Deputy, assisted by four Deputies. These four Deputies will lead other students leaders from Years 10 - 13 who will be divided into four teams, each responsible for the four key areas of our school; charism, curriculum, pastoral and co-curriculum.

- Charism promoting the Catholic culture and ethos of the school and Sixth Form College. The main aim of this team will be to lead events that will help the school community put its faith into action by organising events like fundraising, cultural week, affinity groups etc.
- Curriculum improving the students' experience of the curriculum on offer. The main aim of this team will be to work with teachers and Heads of Department to help improve the curriculum provision by organising participation in school/ college open evenings, working with departments to organise student voice events, Sixth Form students to support for KS3 and KS4 students etc.
- Pastoral improving the students' overall experience in our school community. The main aim of this team will be to work with Heads of Year and tutors, as well as the Deputy Head (Pastoral) and the Pastoral team to help improve the pastoral provision by supporting Year 7 induction activities and events, organising student voice on pastoral issues like evaluating and improving behaviour policy, organising and leading student drop-in sessions for support and mentoring etc.
- Co-curriculum the school's provision of events and programmes that support the curriculum and leads to personal development. The main aim of this team will be to work with Heads of Year, Heads of Department and staff to enhance the co-curricular provision in our school by leading some extracurricular activities on offer in the school like sports, eco and environmental club, Fairtrade, Library etc.

Our aim is to have more students involved in leadership in the school because we believe that when given a chance, young

people do step up and make great contribution to any community. When they take up these leadership roles, our students will acquire skills that will benefit them. We know that a strong student leadership body will result in a better experience for all around the school, and thus fulfil one of the main aims of Catholic education, enabling young people to acquire skills necessary to live life in a certain way; **challenge**, **change and transform** society.

Inaugural Cultural Week at Oaklands

A ccording to the Oxford English Dictionary, culture is the way of life of a people, including their attitudes, values, beliefs, arts, sciences, modes of perception, and habits of thought and activity. At Oaklands, we are proud of our culture as a Catholic school community. However, we are also aware that in our community, there are many cultures represented, especially based on ethnicity.

Following on from our Affinity work in the last couple of years, we decided that we should celebrate this aspect of our community in a more explicit way. We are therefore going to hold our inaugural Cultural Week from Monday 6th–Friday 10th February. During the week, we will celebrate our uniqueness as a community made of people from different cultural backgrounds. We hope that this will be a time for us to learn and know more about the different cultures that are represented in our school. We will have guest speakers come in to share with our students the importance of culture. In some of their lessons, students will engage with the meaning and impact of culture on an individual's life. The week will culminate with a number of our students taking part in a show of cultural dress and attire in catwalk style and performances of song and dance from around the world.

On Friday 10th, we will hold a non-uniform day to allow students who would like to dress in a way that represents their culture to do so. As usual, we would like to collect £2 per student for this, and the money raised will be donated to charity.

More details about the activities for this exciting week will be shared during the next few weeks.

Rewarding Students

We're delighted that our students and parents continue to work with us to make ClassCharts a success. A real benefit of this system is that everyone can see how their efforts and achievements at school have been rewarded in real time. We have an extensive rewards system and commend our students in numerous categories including outstanding work, excellent effort and contribution to school life.

In liaison with students, we've changed our rewards milestones and created milestone beyond Sapphire because the move to ClassCharts has motivated our students to do well, and staff can award them instantaneously as the system is always live on teachers' laptops. This means we're seeing more well-deserved points awarded. Students receive a badge at 50 point increments (bronze, silver, gold, ruby, sapphire and now diamond for 300 points). The increase in positive points means we're on a trajectory to have more Sapphire and Diamond badge holders than ever before, so we're liaising with student council to consider whether we might need to add an even higher one!

Heads of Year, Tutors and subject teachers have been delighted by some of the amazing extra work and community efforts of our students. We're rewarding their hard work, great attitudes to learning and smart uniform whenever we can.

An important addition to our rewards categories are our "ultra-rare" Head of Year and Head Teacher's Awards. These badges are awarded for outstanding special achievements and our Year Heads are always looking carefully at which students should receive these special awards in 2023!

At the end of the summer term, our governors support us in rewarding students who've done particularly well in a subject. The Governors' End of Year Awards are a cornerstone of our ethos of rewarding, and we're excited to be able to hold our traditional awards assemblies at the end of the school year.

We hope that this system highlights the motivation and commitment of our students, and the inclusive and positive nature of our community here at Oaklands.

Post Mortem Live

On January 16th, *The Post-Mortem Live* visited Oaklands Catholic School as part of their 2023 tour. As a reward for hosting the event we were given an exclusive show for around 100 Sixth Form and Year 11 students studying triple Science, all free of charge.

According to their website, the show is "the UK's first immersive live post-mortem experience." This event allows individuals who are interested in the post-mortem industry to not only learn about the process needed to determine the pinnacle cause of death; but to handle and dissect real specimens of porcine origin throughout the event.



Upon arrival, we noticed how surprisingly relaxed the atmosphere was. Students were seated in close proximity so that a clear view of the presentation and the semi-synthetic cadaver could be had. They were able to take photographs of the setting as well as the various dissections they completed. Several tables were spaced throughout the room, allowing all participants to have a chance at dissection.

Sam and his colleagues presented the event. All were engaging, enthusiastic and knowledgeable about their subjects with an abundance of scientific terminology and intriguing facts.

The 4-hour long event, began with a walk-through of what was to come, followed by a general safety talk about proper conduct and the specimens provided to us. After jewellery was removed and sleeves were rolled up, an introductory video was played to set the scene of the death the semisynthetic cadaver had endured. This worked well to create mystery around the cause of his death.

The corpse, presented by the organisation *VIVIT*, is the world's only semi-synthetic cadaver. Filled with real (porcine) organs, the cadaver has been cleverly designed to create a similar experience to that of a real human corpse. It even has visible blood pooling on the skin and body hair. We were extremely impressed with this piece of equipment, but it may not be such a fascinating sight for those of a squeamish nature! The cadaver features a realistic Y-shaped incision down the torso, allowing a full view of the organs inside, demonstrating clearly how much time has been spent on perfecting this model.

Sam, who informed us that he has completed roughly 25 real human dissections, started by explaining the most important terms when describing conditions post-mortem. This included an



in-depth discussion about anatomical position and body dimensions. He then went on to explain brain anatomy and the body's process after death.

Community Unity Opportunity

According to *The Post Mortem Live*, the point of the event is to be able to "*expose students to real specimens, to bolster human anatomy in context, and develop practical skills*."

Dissections of the eye and brain taken from half a pig's head organs was a relaxed but informative experience. Gloves and sanitation stations were provided, and the crew was on hand to answer any questions participants had about the procedure. Guests were provided with tools and allowed to explore the workings of the organs at their leisure. As the event went on, participants learnt more about the story of the cadaver based on the injuries and conditions of his body.

After further presentation and dissection, the cause of death of the cadaver was released, signalling an end to this fantastic experience. Sam, whose knowledge and enthusiasm was admirable, remained on guard to answer any lingering questions after the show. All students were given access information to download a certificate which could be used as any evidence for their college and university applications.

The business development manager of the company reported:

"We absolutely believe that the experience is more beneficial with the inclusion of real specimens, we're giving the audience the opportunity to learn through hands-on dissection, something that is not widely available. After all, how can there be a post-mortem without dissection?"
