## Year 10 Fine Art Vocabulary List

(Tier 2 and Tier 3)



**Analysis** - comparing, commenting on and making informed judgements about artworks.

**Annotation** - a note written to explain or comment on an image or other piece of work.

**Contour** - refers to the outside edges, as well as the defined enclosed edges, of a person, object or mass. Contour drawing is an art technique in which the artist sketches the style of the subject by drawing lines that result in a drawing that is essentially an outline

**Contrast** - is achieved when opposite elements are arranged together

**Development** - the process of growing or changing and becoming more advanced.

**Etching**- a technique of printing in which the image is created using acid to bite lines and shapes into a metal plate that hold the ink used to print the image.

**Evaluation** - the making of a judgement about the amount, number, or value of something; assessment.

**Experimentation**- the action or process of trying out new ideas, methods, or activities.

**Glaze** - to cover (a painted surface or parts of it) with a thin layer of transparent colour in order to modify the tone. to give a glassy surface to, as by polishing.

**Investigation**- the action of investigating something or someone; formal or systematic examination or research.

**Maquette** - usually small preliminary model (as of a sculpture or a building)

**Monoprint** – a form of printmaking where the image can only be made once, unlike most printmaking which allows for multiple originals.

**Observation** - an act or instance of noticing or perceiving.

**Personal Response** - a response is not simply a copy of the work; it should be your own image, but completed in a similar style to your chosen artist.

**Portraiture** - the art of painting or taking portraits.

**Recording** - using materials and media as means of exploring, recording and understanding visual qualities.

**Reduction Print** - creating a layered design by gradually cutting away the surface to reveal layers of colour.

**Still Life** - essentially, the subject matter of a still life painting or sculpture is anything that does not move or is dead.

**Texture** - the feel, appearance, or consistency of a surface or substance.

**Technique** - the method used to create something, eg cross-hatching is a technique used to create tone in a drawing.
