Analyse – examine (something) methodically and in detail, typically in order to explain and interpret it.

Banter – a type of teasing which although usually friendly, easily turns into something people can take offensively.

Budgeting – a way of balancing your income and expenditure on a weekly or monthly basis, so you don't spend more money than you have coming in.

Bullying – seek to harm, intimidate or coerce someone (who is usually perceived as vulnerable).

Citizen - a person who is a member of a country and community.

Citizenship – learning about the communities that we live in and belong to (local, national, global) and how we can be actively involved.

Compare – estimate, measure, or note the similarity or dissimilarity between.

Cyberbullying – the use of electronic communication to bully a person, typically by sending messages of an intimidating or threatening nature.

Describe – to give a detailed account.

Emotions – a strong feeling deriving from one's circumstances, mood, or relationships with others.

Entitlements – a right given to an individual by law.

Entrepreneur – a person who sets up a business or businesses, taking on financial risks in the hope of profit.

Evaluate – form an idea of the amount, number, or value of; assess.

Expenditure – any way you personally spend your money e.g. rent, mortgage, food shopping, bills etc.

Explain – to make something clear or easy to understand by describing or giving information/examples about it.

Genuine friendships – these last for years as they are based on mutual respect and are people who make each other feel good about themselves.

Human Rights Act – a list of rights which all people should be entitled to. In Britain the law has to support these rights.

Income – money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments.

Prejudice – to have a preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience. Prejudging someone without knowing the facts.

Puberty – a time when adolescents' bodies start to change in order for them to become capable of reproduction.

Responsibility – having a duty to perform, something we should do.

Rights – something you are entitled to as a human being, they belong to every person in the world from birth until death.

Stereotype – a stereotype is an over-generalized belief about a particular category of people. It is an expectation that people might have about every person of a particular group.

Values – principles or standards of behaviour; one's judgement of what is important in life.
