Aims of the Course

Aims of the Course:

This course aims to enable students to develop their linguistic skills alongside their understanding of the culture and society of countries where French is spoken.

Students study technological and social change, looking at diversity and the benefits it brings. They will study highlights of French-speaking artistic culture, including francophone music and cinema, and learn about political engagement and who wields political power in the French-speaking world.

Students also explore the influence of the past on present-day French-speaking communities.

Throughout their studies, they will learn the language in the context of French-speaking countries and the issues and influences which have shaped them. Students will study texts and film and have the opportunity to carry out independent research on an area of their choice

Types of Learning Experience:

This is a linear qualification. AS assessment takes place at the end of year 12. The full A Level assessment takes place at the end of year 13. Knowledge is gained through study of texts, interactive audio-visual resources, guides and workbooks. Students carry out independent research and develop the skills of discussion, translation, reading, listening, summarising and essay writing. .

Link Subjects:

French complements all other subjects at A Level and beyond.

Progressing to Higher Education:

French is a recognised A level subject in itself for University and Higher Education as well as a shared degree course across a wide spectrum of subjects.
