## From the Headteacher's Desk

E arlier this week a student asked me why Easter was a movable feast. The origins of this can be found in the different calendars used by ancient Egyptians and Hebrews based on the movement of the sun. The Jews had one based on the phases of the moon, as Islam does, which is why the month of Ramadan moves around the calendar. The solar calendar was adopted by the Romans and the Christian culture to become the modern world's standard. Easter is one of the festivals which tries to harmonise the solar and lunar calendars.

As a general rule, Easter falls on the first Sunday following the first full moon after 21<sup>st</sup> March. So, Easter Sunday can fall as early as 22<sup>nd</sup> March or as late as 25<sup>th</sup> April. This in turn has an impact on how the school year is divided up.

This year we are in school during Holy Week, the seven days leading up to the resurrection of Jesus Christ. One of the traditions of the week is the celebration of the Chrism Mass at the Diocesan Cathedral. It was a privilege to take a number of our confirmation students to the Mass to present the sacred oils.



Last week many of our students were able to celebrate the sacrament of Reconciliation or have a conversation with a priest. During Lent we have worked to support many good causes, caring and supporting those most in need and protecting the world, the Common Good, is part of our mission. Over Lent, asking students to make a small sacrifice is no bad thing. Although we probably will never be called to sacrifice our lives in such a dramatic way as Jesus did, St Paul reminds us that we are to be a 'living sacrifice' because of Jesus' death and resurrection. In this way through small actions of kindness and generosity, we will become more perfect and grow as Jesus' disciples. There have been a number of significant achievements over recent weeks many of them are captured within this edition of the Oaklands News. The Year 9 Rugby team reached the final of the county cup and the three performances of Les Misérables demonstrated the talents of a large number of students; well done to all the artists, musicians, performers, technicians and back stage support. The time given over by staff is also beyond all expectation, over half term almost 250 students enjoyed residential experiences. The students were outstanding ambassadors for the school and their families. Then there are our Sixth Form students who have received their offers from universities, including Oxbridge. It is important that we recognise the success of our students and, of equal importance, the work that we do to facilitate and encourage this.

This is the last edition of the Oaklands news in this format. After Easter we will be moving to a shorter fortnightly web-based publication that will be emailed to parents and supporters. Twice a year we will produce a more substantial document.

Alongside this edition of the Oaklands News I have penned a letter to parents discussing some of the wider issues that school, education and society face.

Finally, I wish you all a happy Easter and I look forward to seeing the students back in school on Monday 15<sup>th</sup> April.

#### Extra-Curricular Timetable for the Summer Term



## Les Misérables

#### Science Week

This year, Science Week took place from 11<sup>th</sup>-17<sup>th</sup> March and had the theme of Time. Students were given the opportunity to participate in a nationwide competition with the British Science Association, making posters which matched the theme. The best five of which will be submitted as a whole school.



Also as part of Science week, 'The Big Plastic Count' took place, with students being given information about plastic waste and the reality of plastic pollution and the long-term hazards it poses to our planet. Key Stage 3 classes were quizzed on this in class, to see how much they actually knew about the problem and they were encouraged to participate in the nationwide count at home with their families.

#### How much plastic waste does the UK generate?

Nearly 100 billion pieces of plastic packaging are thrown away every year by households in the UK.

The UK produces more plastic waste that any other country apart from the USA.

**S** ome of the school's Environmental Group went out to see how much litter they could find in ten minutes. They wanted to investigate the extent of this issue around our school. In just one ten-minute window, the group filled a black bag, just from one area of the school. Some of this litter had even been blown past our fences and into the habitat beyond, posing potential risks to the wildlife.

As part of our focus on the Care of Creation, our students want to encourage everyone to take responsibility for their own litter and recycle where ever possible. They will continue to monitor and try and find solutions to this challenge and we commend them for their efforts!

## **Biology Olympiad**

Twenty-four pupils across the Sixth Form took part in the nationwide, advanced problem-solving competition for A Level students. Designed to challenge those with an interest in Biology, to expand their talents via two multiple choice papers sat online under exam conditions, the British Biology Olympiad requires students to use their biological intuition, logic and imagination to answer a series of questions.

With more than 16,000 students from 800 schools across Great Britain taking part this year, we are hugely proud of all our students who took part, and particular congratulations to Natalia Kurczuk who achieved a Gold medal and was in the top 5% of the country; Jithu Thomas and Jessica Veal were our bronze medalists; Wendy Wheatley, Marvel Soyan, Melissa Hamilton, Maria Mihut and Anna Le Ngoc were all Highly Commended; Veeya Paul, Andrea Ilagan and Melissa Pacheco were Commended. Well done to all who participated in the event this year.

Mrs Gamble, Biology teacher, explains: "The British Biology Olympiad (BBO) challenges and stimulates students with an interest in Biology to expand and extend their talents. Students are presented with topics and ideas which they are not familiar with, so compete with their problemsolving skills and understanding of core principles. In addition to encouraging and rewarding pupils in their studies, the BBO is the first stage in selecting a team to represent the UK at the International Biology Olympiad (IBO). The IBO seeks to challenge by both theory and practical tests some of the top pre-university biology students in the world, with over sixty

countries taking part. This year Natalia Kurczuk will be entering the next round of the qualification, a first time for Oaklands Catholic School."

## **Chemistry Olympiad**


Sixteen Year 12 students entered the Royal Society of Chemistry's Olympiad exam in January. This is a very challenging exam that is aimed at Year 13 students so all sixteen deserve praise for entering. We are happy to say that one student, Sakura Cheraghi, reached Silver with her score and six other students, Shane Blastique, Natalia Kurczuk, Maria Mihut, Wendy Wheatley, Maria Danan and Marvel Soyan, were close behind and achieved Bronze. Congratulations to all of these students who will receive certificates after the Easter break.

## **RSC Schools Analyst Competition**

This will be launched after Easter and is an opportunity for small groups of Year 12 students to work in teams, analysing samples related to a real life problem so that the results can be used to make decisions.









## **Excellence in STEM (cont)**

#### **CREST Awards**

Several groups of Year 12 students are making excellent progress with their Gold CREST projects. One group made four batches of Aspirin to test different acid catalysts and assess their effect on yield and purity of Aspirin. This has given these students a head-start with aspects of the curriculum that they would not experience until Year 13. Some of these groups show-cased their projects during Science week.





A second group have made a bespoke piece of equipment to test if UV light could be used to kill bacteria in air. This involved making a carousel to hold tubes of nutrient broth to which a small amount of E Coli culture was added. Under controlled conditions the turbidity of the broth was measured using a device they made in school. This gave an indication of the amount of bacterial growth and so the effect of UV light could then be seen by varying the tubes exposure. The data generated can then be manipulated to make predictions about how much UV light would be needed to kill bacteria in certain volumes of air.

A third group of Year 12 students are trying to extract citrus oils from fruit so that they can use it to make perfumes. The extraction process has been a difficult one but they have had success recently and confirmed the presence of limonene in a distilled product. This will motivate the team to try extracting other oils and get to the perfume making stage before long.

A fourth group of students are investigating the effectiveness of different sun creams and are just embarking on the project. They will make a piece of equipment to allow uniform testing with a suitable UV lamp to mimic harmful UV rays from the sun and UV light sensitive beads which will mimic the skin's surfaces.

A very big thank you to the Science Lab Technicians wo have helped students with ideas for projects and setting up lab sessions. Thanks also to the Design department who have helped make equipment for some of the projects.


Another reason for holding this event was to allow students to gather feedback about their products from other people; this is the final part of the folder of work they have to submit for assessment towards their GCSE.


