Post-18 pathways



We can broadly summarise these into three below post-18 pathways which we will now explore:

- Continued study
- Apprenticeships
- Employment
- Gap year





Continued study



University degree

- An academic course that is usually studied at a higher education institution.
- There are lots of different types of higher-education level courses available. Higher education means any sort of nationally recognised qualification which is at Level 4 or above (A Levels, BTEC Level 3, Tech Levels and Advanced Apprenticeships are all Level 3 qualifications). A degree starts at Level 4 and progresses to Level 6 in the third year.





Degree providers



Although in the past higher-education courses were just delivered at universities, they are now offered at universities, colleges and also some training providers too.

- Duration: 3 to 4 years (some courses are longer e.g., medicine, veterinary science, architecture).
- Entry requirements: Universities set their own entry requirements. Usually need A Levels or equivalent qualifications
- Qualifications: Ordinary or honours degree
- Leads to: Postgraduate taught or research degrees, professional qualifications, graduate employment

Continued study



Higher technical skills courses

Opportunity to learn the higher level skills that employers want in sectors like finance, engineering, management and scientific jobs on a classroom-taught course.

- Location: College or university, some of which specialise in subjects as part of an Institute of Technology or National College
- Duration: 1 to 2 years
- Entry requirements: Varies by course
- Qualifications: Higher Nationals (HNC/Ds), foundation degrees, certificate/diploma
 of higher education and various other technical qualifications
- Leads to: Skilled employment in higher technical job or higher levels of study

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships

Advanced higher and degree apprenticeships combine practical on-thejob skills training with off-the-job learning. This includes training that is relevant to a job and provides a salary.

Location: 80% of the time in the workplace and 20% off-the-job with some study in a college, training centre or Institute of Technology (IoT)

- Duration: A minimum of 1 year
- Entry requirements: Will be dependent on the industry, job role and apprenticeship level
- Qualifications: apprenticeship certificate, diploma, degree and masters depending on level
- Leads to: Work, next level of apprenticeship, further education, higher education

Apprenticeships



- There are now plenty of sectors offering Higher and Degree Apprenticeship (Level 4+) opportunities.
- But remember, an apprenticeship will train someone to do a job so your son/daughter needs to be happy that is the job they want to do. Also, these have to be applied for like a job, so candidates have to be pro-active in finding a vacancy.
- For students studying Level 3 qualifications who are not sure whether they want to go to university or do an apprenticeship then the advice is: apply to university through UCAS (you can decline any offers later) <u>AND</u> look for an apprenticeship at the same time.



Employment



Get straight into the working world to start earning. This will require need an up-to-date CV and cover letter.

Careers advice and practice interviews can be arranged on request in the Sixth Form.





Employment

Start a business

Becoming an entrepreneur can be exciting, but think carefully about your ideas and make a solid business plan.

 Entry requirements: You may need special skills, qualifications or experience before you can start a business. There may also be start-up costs.











Gap year

- A gap year usually means taking a year out in between your studies, often at age 18 and after Level 3 qualifications such as A Levels, etc. There are lots of things to do on a gap year like travelling, working or volunteering.
- Some people apply and get a place at university and then ask for their place to be deferred so that they can have a gap year. Those interested in a gap year will need to request a deferred place when you apply via UCAS.
- A gap year can offer a great opportunity to develop personal and employability skills or to get experience working in a job area of interest or to meet people from different cultures. Also, some people use their gap year to confirm what sort of job or career they are interested in before they choose their next step. And, for some, having A-Level grades in the bag before applying for university can help decide what and where to apply to, especially if it is a very competitive course or students did better than anticipated.





Gap year - pros and cons



PROS

- The experiences you gain can make you better prepared for university, both academically and socially
- It's probably the longest 'holiday' you will ever be able to take in your life - taking long breaks will be harder once your career starts
- You can use some or all of the time to earn money for university, taking the pressure of your finances
- You can learn new skills
- Volunteering gives you the opportunity to help people
- Both volunteering and working will provide valuable work experience

If you didn't get the grades in one of your Alevels, you can retake it and reapply while using the rest of your time to do something else

CONS

- If you want to travel or take part in an organized gap year programme, it could be expensive
- There may be changes to your course or your student finance package during your year off
- Unless you revise, you can forget a lot in a year that would be useful to your course
- If you've got a university offer and haven't already agreed to defer your place, you could be putting your place at risk
- If you don't get organised, you may end up spending your gap doing nothing but watching TV. Not great for the CV!

How to stand out from the crowd

- Universities are looking for students that can stay the course
- Personal statements allow student to demonstrate WHY they are suitable and why they should have a place on the course
- Personal statements should include motivation for the course, preparedness for the course and preparation through other experiences
 - Preparation is key. Students are being encouraged to reflect on what they have learnt outside of their A level curriculum.
 HE Plus this has finished now and 45 students attended
 EPQ continuing, with final submission January 2025





How to stand out from the crowd



Unifrog is key here

This online platform is the perfect place to record any extra curricular experiences

Reflect upon what they experienced at **HE plus** – favourite topic/lecture, what questions did it raise, will they research further, why, what interested them so much? **REFLECT** and TAKE IT FURTHER

Documentary/Podcast – do the same thing! This encourages extra knowledge and understanding; grow the context of their subject interests. **REFLECT and TAKE IT FURTHER**

EPQ – just because the university does not accept it as part of their offer does not mean that the project is not useful/important/great preparation for university. **Don't let them just give up because it takes effort...**

- <u>29 January 2025</u> official UCAS deadline

Post 18 options

There are a lot of options to choose from at 18. What's right for you will depend on your situation and the career or job you have in mind.

You may be eligible for the <u>16 to 19 Bursary Fund</u>, which can help with things like books, travel or equipment if you will struggle with education or training costs.

If you have an Education Health and Care (EHC) plan there may be different and more suitable options available to you.

You can find out about financial support for university from Student Finance.
