Year 12 Geography Trip to Dorset 2024

The advancement of Geographical skills, studying coastal case studies and experiencing fieldwork were the reasons for the recent trip to the Isle of Purbeck for our Year 12 Geography students.



The students were accompanied by Mr Godwin, Mrs Sykes and Mr Bamford and stayed at Swanage YHA.

Day 1: Students studied how coastal management has been conducted along Christchurch Bay from Hengistbury Head to Hurst Castle Spit. The cliffs at Barton-On-Sea and Highcliffe suffer from rotational slumping and this location is quoted in almost every textbook, so it was really useful for our students to actually see what was happening there.

Following a brief lunch stop at Mudeford spit, students drove through Bournemouth and on to Studland via the Sandbanks ferry. The students studied the sand dunes there and tested the concept of vegetation succession and how effective management is in preserving them. Late in the afternoon, the geology of the Purbeck coast was explored as the students were shown Old Harry Rocks at the chalk headland of Handfast Point.

Day 2: The Geology along the coast from Exmouth in Devon to Old Harry Rocks in Dorset has resulted in the area being branded a 'UNESCO World Heritage site' which puts the area on a par with the Grand Canyon and the Great Barrier Reef. Students explored Durdle Door, Lulworth Cove and Stair Hole, although the highlight of the trip this year was the boat tour from Lulworth Cove to Durdle Door. The group visited Portland Bill, discussed the raised beach there and examined Chesil Beach which connects the island of Portland to the mainland. We also visited Poundbury on the outskirts of Dorchester. Poundbury is an experimental new town/extension of Dorchester, with a design endorsed by King Charles on whose land it is built.

Day 3: The final morning was spent around Swanage. The students surveyed the groynes along the beach to see if they were effective in building up the beach and examined rates of longshore drift.

The trip was designed to provide students with data and skills for their coursework report which is worth 20% of their A Level.
