From the Headteacher's Desk

Last week I went to the Festival of Speed at Goodwood, it is an event that stirs emotions for petrol heads. The highlight of the weekend is the Hill Climb Shoot Out; cars of various vintages and power race up the hill to achieve the fastest time. To entertain the crowd there is a background commentary, making comparisons between cars and drivers.

Comparisons can be dangerous as they are a relative measure: how often do we compare ourselves against other people? We lose sight of the notion of personal best. We are pressurised, through media portrayal, to be the same as or better than others.

Well, it can be quite liberating if we take a step back and acknowledge that some people will do things better than us and accept that God made us unique for a reason. With this thought we move from comparing or judging ourselves, relative to another, to being absolute. It is the absolute measure that is important in the eyes of God.

We are what we are for a reason, and God wants us that way. At the end of a very busy term where we have been formed by our experience, let us ask for the grace to see ourselves as He sees us. In the words of St Catherine of Siena, "If you are who you should be, you will set the world on fire." This has been quite an extraordinary year. Almost twelve months ago we experienced the tragic death of Alan Hammond our Site Manager, this had a profound effect on all of us. A few weeks ago we invited his family to a dedication service, it was a joyous occasion. They described it as 'beautiful' and they were able to reflect on the support we gave him in life and death. There have been many examples of how the school has supported students, staff and families over recent years. Alan's passing was a reminder to us all that we are temporary both in life and the positions we have, at some point we all move on, hoping we have left our mark, Alan certainly did.

The extra-curricular life of the school has been exceptional this year. This is testament to the benevolence and dedication of staff. Not only do these activities provide a unique experience, they help build relationships. For me the school show is always one of the extra-curricular highlights. Over the course of the year I have received many positive comments, from parents by email, in the supermarket or in the vestibule leaving church about how staff enrich the lives of young people. By the time you read this the Summer Iceland trip may have come and gone.

The spiritual life of the school has developed considerably over this year. Many parents have commented on this, in particularly the inclusion of The Oaklands Way in the newsletter. One of the privileges of Headship is being able to attend the celebration of Mass as part of 'the job'. I am grateful to our priests for the ministry and service they provided this year.

It has been a pleasure to receive students who have made exceptional progress in the classroom, overcome adversity or represented the school. Again this year, I have written to many families, offering congratulations and recognising their child's endeavours at school. This week I celebrated the success of Year 10 with their practice interviews, and students who particularly impressed the interviewer will be receiving letters of commendation next week.

So, as this year draws to a close, it is always good to see prospective Year 12 students in school sampling Sixth Form life, a sobering reminder that the next academic year is just around the corner! Please take time to read this packed edition of Oaklands News. Term dates for 2024-25 can be found further down and on the school website.

Thank you for your prayers, support and encouragement over the last year. Enjoy the holiday, recharge, enjoy the long hours of sunshine (Hopefully), enjoy family and friends, and I look forward to seeing you all again in the new term. Sixth Form UCAS and Post-18 Pathways Day

The success of these events is evident in the record number of favourable offers our students have received this year for various highly competitive courses in leading universities (including Oxbridge) and other institutions. Year 12 Enrichment Week

This year, we launched the first Sixth Form Enrichment Week, which ran in tandem with the main school Challenge Week. Our students undertook work-related learning placements and UCAS preparation sessions during the week. Oaklands Mission

In September we learned about the history of Oaklands and events leading up to when, in 1971, the Sisters of Christ gave their school to Portsmouth Diocese and it became known as Oaklands Catholic Comprehensive Catholic School.

We adopted the motto from the Sisters of Christ 'O crux ave, spes unica' which translates as 'Our cross, our only hope' and adapted it to say 'United by The Cross'.

To the Sisters, everything they did was defined by the CROSS.

Their Charism and Mission is captured by the CROSS, a sign of LOVE and SERVICE.

The CROSS is also at heart of everything we do at Oaklands today

At Oaklands, the principles of Catholic Social Teaching are key to what we do and what we are about. Each of the principles helps us to realise our Charism of love and service, as they all link together. For example, by teaching our students about Rights and Responsibilities, we also help them realise that respect for Human Dignity is important, and in doing so, they can see that we all need to work together for the Common Good. This means that we must particularly pay attention to the needs of the most vulnerable in our community (Option for the Poor) and stand in Solidarity with those who need our support.
