From the Headteacher's Desk

November is often regarded as a unique month within the Church calendar, almost resembling its own distinct liturgical season. This month serves as a time for reflection and prayer for the souls of the departed, inviting contemplation on the body of Christ and the promise of eternal life. The liturgical practices during November carry a distinct essence that hints at the upcoming celebrations in December, while simultaneously reminding us of our human mortality. It is particularly significant for our Catholic community, as we dedicate time to pray for those who have passed away, with notable observances such as All Saints and All Souls Day before we move on to the Solemnity of Christ the King at the end of the month.

Upon entering the White House, visitors will be immediately drawn to the poignant display of remembrances arranged by the History department, with special acknowledgment to Dr Colvin for her efforts. Images from this display are available on our social media platforms. Earlier today, we observed a two minute silence accompanied by the playing of the Last Post. Educating children about the significant historical events of the past not only honours those sacrifices but also inspires a commitment to a future where such sacrifices are not forgotten. By discussing the importance of Remembrance Day, we instil in young minds an understanding of history's relevance and the vital necessity of fostering peace.

Culture Week Show

The week of 21st to 25th October was very special at Oaklands – it was Culture Week, a time when members of our community were invited to think about their cultural identity and find ways to celebrate it. Each person belongs to a culture, and every community is underpinned by its culture. At Oaklands, our culture is captured and summarised in our mission statement.

St John's Week

Medjugorje Pilgrimage

During half term, a group of Year 9 and Year 10 students, along with Mr and Mrs Semple and Mrs Vary joined parishioners from the Sacred Heart in Waterlooville on pilgrimage to Medjugorje, a town in Bosnia and Herzegovina. There has been a Catholic pilgrimage site in Medjugorje since 1981, when six locals claimed



to see apparitions of the Virgin Mary. Known as "Our Lady of Medjugorje," these apparitions conveyed messages of peace, prayer, and conversion.


The Holy Spirit is alive in Medjugorje and Our Lady is truly present encouraging us to come back to her Son Jesus and spread Peace, peace, peace.

The students enjoyed the pilgrimage very much. When asked what was good about the trip, some of the students said:

We also went to Vicka's (who was one of the six visionaries that Our Lady appeared to) house, swimming in the Adriatic Sea, going to confession and adoration of Our Lord Jesus Christ. One of the final activities we did was climb to the top of Cross Mountain whilst praying the rosary on the way up. I am very thankful that our Mother called me to come to Medjugorje and hope she does the same in the future."

Remembrance Day


Remembrance Day has its roots in Armistice Day, which was first commemorated in Great Britain on 11th November 1919, to mark the one-year anniversary of the peace agreement that ended the First World War. After the conclusion of the Second World War, the British government, seeking to honour participants in both World Wars, officially replaced Armistice Day with the new Sunday observance, which was thereafter known as Remembrance Sunday.

In 1956 the date was fixed as the second Sunday of the month of November.

How do we honour Remembrance Day at Oaklands?

Outside the White House you will see the History Department display. You will see lots of poppies that have messages from staff at Oaklands but also our Year 9 students who are currently learning about the First World War in their History lessons.

You will also see four display boards. These are really important as they inform you of people closely connected to the school and their actions in the First World War: Edward Ingouville Williams, Miss Emily Caroline Napier, Private Jess Coppin, The Ladies of Waterlooville and the Flags of the East Yorkshire Regiment.

You have created each of us in Your image, bestowing upon us an inherent dignity that cannot be diminished.


Help us, Lord, to recognise and honour this sacred gift in every person we encounter.
