From the Headteacher's Desk

Despite the cold weather, the start of term has been very positive. We have been very impressed by the attitude that your children have been displaying since returning from the Christmas break. The school feels calm, purposeful, and it is an absolute pleasure to see students engaged in their learning during lesson times.

This term is marked by several significant events. Recently, we held the Year 11 parents' evening, and Year 9 students will officially commence their options process at the Options Evening on 30th January. Your engagement in your child's decision-making is vital, and we appreciate your readiness to collaborate with us during this important phase. Additionally, later in the term, we will host the school show, which consistently stands out as a highlight of the academic year.

A new year is a great time to hit the 'reset' button. One important topic to discuss with your child is the value of courtesy and good manners. While these qualities are primarily instilled at home, students often need clear examples of how to practice them in the bustling school setting. We believe that it is essential for students to show politeness towards both their peers and staff, using appropriate language.

We are confident that every child, regardless of their background or needs, can learn to be polite and courteous. When a student falls short, we address it - often with a touch of humour - and guide them on how to improve their language, tone, or behaviour. Although it may seem like a small focus for the start of the year, these little improvements are crucial for fostering positive relationships within the school community, ultimately contributing to a strong and effective school culture.

From the Chaplain

On Christmas Eve, Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St Peter's Basilica, thus officially opening the Year of Jubilee 2025.

In the Catholic Church, a Jubilee or Holy Year is a special year of forgiveness and reconciliation, in which people are invited to come back into a right relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation.



A Jubilee Year is celebrated by the Church every 25 years. This has been the case since 1470, when Pope Paul II changed it from every 50 years. And 2025 is a Jubilee year; a year of celebration and joy.

The theme is Pilgrims of Hope. Pope Francis has invited Catholics to renew our hope and discover a vision that can "restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone". We are also invited to rediscover a spirituality of God's creation in which we understand ourselves as "pilgrims on the earth" rather than masters of the world. In this year of Jubilee, Pope Francis is asking all of us to be signs of hope in the world.

The Jubilee Year is an opportunity to respond to God's call to turn to him and to pursue justice. In the Jubilee Year of 2000 many Christians joined together to call for cancellation of debt owed by the world's poorest countries.

Often people will go on pilgrimage during a Jubilee year, to Rome or another holy site. Pope Francis writes:

"Pilgrimage is of course a fundamental element of every Jubilee event. Setting out on a journey is traditionally associated with our human quest for meaning in life. A pilgrimage on foot is a great aid for rediscovering the value of silence, effort and simplicity of life."

From this moment on, you are now a pilgrim of hope, and we are all on this journey together.

St John's, Korogocho Update



St John's have now returned to school (Monday 6th January) for the new academic year - with students moving up a grade (year group) and beginning their studies with fresh enthusiasm and anticipation. The new academic year in Korogocho started however, with the sad news of the passing of Father Mario Porto. Father Porto gave 43 years' worth of service to the local community in Korogocho and throughout the entirety of Kenya, offering words of wisdom, guidance and love in his time. St John's held a requiem mass in his honour to celebrate his accomplishments and pay tribute to his memory and contributions to St John's.

In other news, due to the success of the St John's Week and various other fundraising, we have increased our full-time sponsorship numbers to 95 children (previously 90). This means we are supporting 95 children for at least three terms and many others as part of part-time sponsorship. This is a huge achievement and testament to the fruitful partnership we have built.


extraordinary when we invite Him in. This miracle also reminds us of the importance of faith - Mary told the servants, 'Do whatever He tells you.'

Faith Unity Week is a period dedicated to promoting unity and understanding among people of various faiths, focusing on fostering dialogue, collaboration, and mutual respect.


It generally emphasises interfaith harmony rather than exclusively Christian unity. It's important because it promotes Peace and understanding, fosters respect and combats Prejudice.


Help us see that we are responsible for the good maintenance of the places we share as a community, and that we are responsible for taking care of them in order for everyone to have a good experience.

JUST AS FOOD BANKS PROVIDE FOOD, WE SUPPLY QUALITY CLOTHING FOR CHILDREN AGED 2-16 YEARS.

We believe that decent, comfortable clothing is vital to children's health, well-being and development.

Our mission is to help local families who need a hand kitting out their children.

We collect quality garments and footwear for kids aged 2-16 years at our warehouse in Portsmouth. Clothing donations come from local people and commercial retailers. All the clothing we provide to families is in good, clean condition.

To be sure our clothing kits reach those who would benefit most and to protect anonymity, we distribute them exclusively via local community organisations and schools already working with families. They let us know what families need for their children and our team of volunteers make up bespoke clothing kits accordingly.

Every kit comes neatly packaged in a smart bag, labelled only with the child's age and gender. There is no judgement or stigma – this is a hand-out.
