This week in school students performed Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat. Our school shows are a mammoth undertaking and are always something very special. Congratulations to all those involved both on stage, in the band or beavering away backstage; School productions are a team event. Over the last 18 years, I have seen many exceptional performances; some of our past students have gone on to appear in the West End others are on tour with world-class orchestras, and it all started at Oaklands.

The benefits for youngsters participating in the performing arts are extensive and multifaceted. Taking part in these activities fosters the development of social, emotional, physical, and academic competencies, leading to improvements in cognitive abilities, motor skills, and interpersonal interactions. Involvement in music, dance and performance encourages collaboration and the formation of meaningful connections with teachers and peers, thereby strengthening their sense of community within the school environment. Moreover, studies in the field of mental health indicate that approximately one in ten children are diagnosed with mental health disorders; thus, active participation in the performing arts significantly mitigates this risk.

Considering the benefits and the fact that our creative industries are world-beating I fail to understand why school performance measures were allowed to drive the Arts to the margins of the curriculum in many schools. Over the past ten years, there has been a significant decline in the number of students enrolling in Music, Drama, and other creative disciplines at GCSE, largely due to the national focus on achieving EBacc targets. Despite this, at Oaklands, we have consistently prioritised the visibility of Performing Arts within our curriculum, ensuring that Music and Drama remain accessible options for all students at the GCSE level.

Well done to all once again and roll on next year's performance.

GCSE & A Level Art: Trip to the Tate

The visit was designed to provide students with valuable resources and ideas to inform their upcoming final exams.



The students had the opportunity to immerse themselves in world-class contemporary and modern art, exploring a diverse range of exhibitions showcasing various artistic movements and styles. This exposure to such a breadth of artistic expression aimed to broaden their understanding and stimulate their own creative thinking.

Photography students focused their attention on capturing the unique architecture of the Tate Modern building itself, as well as the surrounding urban landscape. This practical exercise allowed them to develop their architectural and environmental photography skills whilst also exploring the interplay of light, shadow, and form.




The Oaklands Way
