








Discover pathways

- Certificate of Higher Education (CertHE) and Diploma of Higher Education (DipHE): first and second year of a degree course.
- **Higher National Certificate (HNC) and Higher National Diploma (HND):** HNC is a one-year industry specific course, and the HND is a two-year industry specific course.
- Higher apprenticeships: provide an opportunity to gain Level 4 qualifications or above, e.g. HND, or foundation degree while you work. Can take from one to five years to complete, depending on the course level.
- **Foundation degree:** flexible vocational qualification, combining both academic study and workplace learning. It usually takes two years to complete.
- Bachelor's or undergraduate degree: a three to four-year course which can also be available as a parttime option, allowing you to study and work.
- **Degree apprenticeships:** enable you to gain a full undergraduate or master's degree while you work. Degree apprenticeships take three to six years to complete, depending on the course.

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When can I apply?

- Not one deadline
- Advertised throughout the year
- Larger organisations with multiple application processes may recruit earlier than smaller local organisations
- Higher apprenticeships with a Sep/Oct start tend to recruit in the previous academic year

6 steps to follow









How can I apply?

- Applications are made directly through the company or the education provider.
- There is no limit on the number of applications you can make.
- The application process might vary across vacancies, you could be asked for:
 - CV and Covering Letter
 - Application Form
 - In App/Site application
- You can apply for universities and apprenticeships at the same time!



Main deadline dates

- **★** Wednesday 21 May 2025 Application and registration day
- **✗** June/July − completion of Personal Statement
- **★ 15 October 2025** deadline for applications to Oxford or Cambridge universities and for applications to **medicine**, **dentistry and veterinary medicine/science**
 - School Deadline 19 September 2025
- **★** 7 November 2025 school deadline for completion of form in all other applications
- **★** 14 January 2026 official UCAS deadline
- **★** Every Tuesday 3.30-4.30 University help and advice

- First offer back from university
- - October 11
- November 11

- Out of 92 applications 69 students had at least 1 offer before Christmas

Universities and colleges can't see your other choices when you apply.



Apply by the equal consideration date.



Five choices, unless applying to study medicine, veterinary, medicine/science, dentistry – then it's four choices.



You can't apply to both Oxford and Cambridge.

Choosing the right place for you

- **Style** from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities/colleges, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are in large cities, others in small towns, by the coast or in the countryside
 it's all a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- **Size** larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- Culture and facilities influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics; it can be useful to find out what jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees can vary between universities and colleges; check if there are scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.



Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research?
 How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?



Completing the UCAS application











Student registers for a UCAS Hub account to carry out research and start application.

Student completes all sections of the application and sends it to their school/college.

Teacher or adviser reviews the application and adds reference and predicted grades.

Applications are sent to UCAS by the school or college on behalf of the student.

Universities and colleges make thei decisions on the application.





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Start early

Include:

- academic achievements, past and present
- interest in the course area
- knowledge of the subject area
- enthusiasm to go beyond the syllabus
- details of independent study skills





Consider...

Universities and colleges will consider:

- Have you chosen the course for the right reasons?
- Can you achieve in a new learning environment?
- Do you have a range of interests and aptitudes?
- Do you have a depth of interest in the subject?
- Have you studied independently?
- Do you appear motivated and committed?
- Do you have good numeracy and literacy skills?

They may also ask for:

Why is the Personal Statement changing?

Previous UCAS research found 79% of students felt that the process of writing the statement was difficult to complete without support.

The new format will ensure students from all backgrounds better understand the key information universities and colleges want to know about them, when making admissions decisions.

The three sections, each carefully scaffolded with specific, mandatory questions will improve the application experience for all.

Overall word count **still 4000** characters

<u>Minimum</u> of 350 for each section – flexibility suits the differing needs of subjects. (theoretical/applied/vocational e.g. nursing or medicine which will need more work experience than a theoretical course such as English or History)



The purpose remains clear

The personal statement remains a student's opportunity to:

- show passion, curiosity and knowledge.
- evidence relevant skills and potential.
- communicate genuine interest and a desire to learn more.

The structure is there to encourage students, providing prompts to:

- link their academic, extra-curricular and other experiences to their chosen area(s) of study.
- there's no right or wrong.

Examples could fit into more than one section, remember:

- the important thing is to explain why they're including it and what they've learned from it.
- the statement will still be reviewed as one piece.



What are the questions?



Why do you want to study this course or subject?



How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject?



What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?

Q3: What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and ICAS why are these experiences useful?

Examples should be **reflective** and **demonstrate** further **suitability** for the subject or course(s), this could include:

Work experience, employment, or volunteering

- In-person or virtual work experience.
- Paid for work or volunteering.
- The key thing is reflection on the experiences and the skills gained relevant to their chosen course(s).

Personal life experiences or responsibilities:

- Is there a situation they've personally overcome that has influenced their decision?
- Are there personal experiences that have helped them develop essential qualities for the course?

Hobbies and any extracurricular or outreach activities:

- Think sports, reading, community work, summer schools.
- Any activities outside of core studies that help further showcase why they'd make a great student.

Achievements outside of school or college

 This could be a position of responsibility for local clubs or groups, competitions, or qualifications they've attained outside of the classroom.

How to stand out from the crowd

Unifrog is key here

This online platform is the perfect place to record any extra curricular experiences, including work experience. All students should be planning work experience for 23-27 June 2025, during Enrichment Week.

Reflect upon what they experienced at HE plus – favourite topic/lecture, what questions did it raise, will they research further, why, what interested them so much?

REFLECT and TAKE IT FURTHER

Documentary/Podcast – do the same thing! This encourages extra knowledge and understanding; grow the context of their subject interests. **REFLECT and TAKE IT FURTHER**

EPQ – just because the university does not accept it as part of their offer does not mean that the project is not useful/important/great preparation for university. **Don't let them just give up because it takes effort...**
