Dissection Lab Event

On March 15th, Oaklands Catholic School had the privilege of hosting The Dissection Live, an immersive and educational experience designed for students interested in healthcare and medical sciences. Around 80 lucky students from Years 10 to 13 from Oaklands and other schools and colleges in the area, were given the opportunity to attend the event and some 20 of our students were able to do so free of charge.



According to The Dissection Live website, the program offers 'a unique and immersive live dissection experience designed to enhance education for students interested in or pursuing careers in healthcare. Whether studying for GCSEs, A Levels, or preparing for further education and medical school, our expert-led sessions provide an in-depth exploration of human anatomy, making complex subjects more engaging and accessible.'

The event was led by Sam and his colleague Dan, both of whom were engaging, enthusiastic, and highly knowledgeable in their field. The day was structured into two sessions, with the morning session lasting two hours. It began with an introductory walkthrough, followed by a safety briefing on proper conduct and handling of specimens. After removing jewellery and rolling up their sleeves, students participated in an icebreaker activity that involved administering anaesthesia to a mock 'patient' in preparation for surgery.



Students had the opportunity to dissect the eye and brain from a pig's head in a structured yet relaxed learning environment. Gloves and sanitation stations were readily available, and the facilitators were on hand to answer any questions. Participants were provided with dissection tools and encouraged to explore the anatomical structures at their own pace.

After a well-earned break in the sunshine, the three-hour long afternoon session delved into more advanced dissections, including a thorax and an intestine dissection. Sam's enthusiasm and expertise remained evident throughout, as he continued to answer students' questions even after the session concluded. At the end of the event, attendees were given access to a downloadable certificate, which can serve as valuable evidence for college and university applications.

Events like this provide an invaluable opportunity for students to gain a realistic and hands-on insight into the medical field. Encouraging participation in such experiences is crucial in inspiring the next generation of healthcare professionals.

Happily, and thanks to the generosity of the organisers, we had a couple of left-over pig's heads, which we shared with some of our Sixth Form Biologists and 7 St Catherine on Monday 17th March, kickstarting Science week with a bang. Lots of happy faces all round!


Portsmouth University Trip

The Year 12 Physics students had the opportunity to spend a day in the new mission control centre at the University of Portsmouth. The students were simulating the experience that an engineering and space company would have when trying to get a satellite into Earth's orbit. The students spent their day designing a satellite capable of detecting radio transmissions from deep space, before then embarking on some challenging calculation work that focussed on firing the satellite into orbit, and determining how much power would be needed to ensure it maintained its flight for as long as possible. It was fantastic to see all of the students really throwing themselves into the experience and taking on some very tricky problem collaboratively.

Gospel Reflection


The Parable of the Prodigal Son has a simple message:
There is nothing we can do that God cannot (or will not) forgive.
We are the son, God is the Father. Whenever we mess up, sin, and run away from God, He will always come running to us with open arms, ready to forgive. Seek forgiveness from God this Lent.



If you are a Catholic, you might go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation during Lent. This is an opportunity to prioritise your relationship with God and to spend time repenting and trusting in His love and forgiveness.

Sacrifice and Salvation

In a spiritual sense, sacrifice is an act of offering something to God, such as time, prayer, or fasting, as a sign of faith and devotion. In Christianity, Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the ultimate example of love and redemption, as He gave His life for the salvation of humanity.



In Christianity, salvation is a gift from God, made possible through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Because of original sin, humanity was separated from God, but through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, believers are offered forgiveness, grace (God's unconditional love), and the promise of eternal life. Salvation is received through faith in Jesus, repentance, and living according to God's will.

Catholic Social Teaching at Oaklands

In our weekly reflections this half term, we have focused on the Catholic Social Teaching principle of solidarity. (Solidarity - the belief that we are brothers and sisters, belong to each other and must stand up for each other.) This has enabled us to look at how different departments teach about this in their subject areas, as well as looking at ways we can 'live out' this principle in our everyday lives.

Some of the questions we reflected on were, 'What does it mean to stand up for others?' and, 'How can we do this?' We reflected on the story of St Oscar Romero and how what he did can inspire us to action too. We also held the CAFOD Fast Day, where community members held some fundraising events. As a school, our obligations to our SEND students represent our commitment to being in solidarity with these students and their families.

Another example of us 'living out' this principle is seen in our Oaklands+ Student Leadership Programme, where our student leaders mentor their peers and students at St Peter's Catholic Primary School.

As we come to our Easter break, we can reflect on this Spring term and say that we have done well in thinking about important things for our school community to flourish. Our CST focus helps us think about practical ways to continue instilling certain values in our community.
