D of E Award Update

At the start of the Easter holiday, the expedition season got underway when three groups set out on three day Practice Expeditions. For the first time in many years we were blessed with sunny and clear days although the nights remained very cold.



The two Gold groups ventured to a new expedition area on the Isle of Wight. They set off early from Carisbrooke Castle to walk to the campsite on the coast above Brighstone Bay. The second day saw the groups navigate a circular route out to the west of the island and finally on the final day a route north took them up to Parkhurst Forest.



Meanwhile the Silver group started their expedition at Harting Down and navigated to camp at Cocking.

On Day 2 they too undertook a circular route around East Dean and finally on the last day a route south to finish near Goodwood Racecourse.

Both expeditions provided a good navigational challenge for the groups and helped them to prepare for their assessed expeditions later in the year which take place for the Gold groups on the Isle of Purbeck and for the Silver group out towards Winchester. With thanks to all our supervisors and minibus driver who gave up their time to enable these expeditions to take place.

We are now looking forward to our Bronze expeditions which take place over weekends in May and June on the South Downs.

Havant Rotary Technology Tournament

On 26th March, two Oaklands teams, 'The Mighty Oaks' and 'The Slightly Lesser Oaks' took part in the First Technology Tournament organised by The Havant Rotary. Students were required to work in teams of four to design, test and present a working prototype of a Space Capsule Launcher.



Students had to design the launcher to enable the space capsule to land as closely as possible to the launch pad, the space capsule to reach a height of at least 3 metres, and the space capsule to be fired after a ten-second countdown from a distance of 1 metre. Both of our teams rose to the challenge using ingenuity, resilience and teamwork to engineer incredibly effective launchers.
