It is a genuine opportunity to work in a cross-curricular way and to learn new information and skills that we could not deliver through our normal curriculum and timetable structure.

All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 will have an assembly outlining the 'theme' of their respective weeks. This booklet is intended to give you all the information you need as parents / carers about what your child will be doing each day of the week and so I would encourage you to read it carefully and keep it somewhere safe. ### The Scenario

The week will be about working in groups and creating a sense of community through the lens of Humanities subjects. There are also specific Geography and History activities that wil take place on Tuesday and Wednesday.

**MONDAY** begins with a briefing session where students learn who they are creating a community with for the week. Later on the first day the students will rotate around 4 different workshops in their groups to have input on the creation of a commuity and to develop a team spirit (RE session on conflict, sporting activity, language translation activity and flag creation).

On Tuesday and Wednesday, students will work in History or Geography, depending on the GCSE options courses they have chosen. There are some students who do both, but I will have talked to them to see which route they wish to take.

TUESDAY – Geography students	TUESDAY – History students
Students will be experiencing fieldwork at Hayling beach. Students will be collecting data to ascertain if the coastal management strategies employed at the location are effective. In their GCSE exam, Y11 Geography students need to be able to write about a fieldwork experience in their Paper 3. Although students will go out on fieldwork again towards the end of Year	History students will spend the day looking at how Portsmouth has defended itself through time. Students will visit Fort Nelson in the morning to look at the defences there from the 1860s instigated by Lord Palmerston due to fear of French invasion.
10, this trip will provide students with some of the key skills they will need. In the afternoon, students will go to Staunton Country Park and conduct orienteering to navigate their way around a route. Students will use map skills, which are examined in GCSE Geography. They will also study the new reservoir being built to the northern end of the park, which is part of a Year 11 topic.	In the afternoon, students will visit Portchester Castle. Portchester's exterior walls are Roman, but the Keep is Norman. The location has also been used as a prison during the Napoleonic wars too. Therefore, students will learn how the threats to Portsmouth have changed spanning almost 2000 years.

**WEDNESDAY** – students will be back in school doing follow-up work based on the trips the day before. Geographers will collate the data and learn how to display and analyse it, which are key skills required for the GCSE paper 3 in Year 11. History students will do something similar, focussing on the skills that are required for success in their exam papers. Geography will also do some further 'human' Geography fieldwork in areas close to school (pedestrian counts, traffic counts etc).

**THURSDAY** Students will have been working together in their groups from Monday whilst on their study days with History and Geography on Tuesday and Wednesday. On Thursday, we return to the theme of community and teamwork from Monday. Students will build a shelter on the school cricket field having gathered materials from the woods. Each team will also be provided with a pack of materials too. Teams will have about 3 hours to complete their preparations and then it is JUDGEMENT time!

All teams will need to be able to make a **three-minute pitch**, showcasing their design to a selection of judges. The judges will be listening and asking the teams a variety of questions. They will also be quizzed on their new community by members of staff. Then a collective decision will be made regarding a series of awards:

- Most innovative and inventive design
- Rest use of materials
- 🍀 Best team flag and logo
- Best presentation
- 🍀 Best team spirit
- The religious aspect of the shelter
- 🍀 Water challenge



While students are waiting for the results they will be provided with an outdoor BBQ and some snacks to cook. They will have lunch in their groups and eat together to further strengthen their spirit of community.

#### History/Geography trips - further information

#### Times

Most of the ground is uneven and can be very muddy when wet, so DO NOT wear flip flops. Please ensure that your shoes are sensible and appropriate for the activity.

Please note that although voluntary contributions are asked towards the week, these contributions are essential if the week's activities are to run. As with all trips and activities and in accordance with the Governors' Charges and Remissions Policy if parents are reluctant to support these events through donations, then planned activities will not take place due to lack of other funding being available.

The 80 students that are going on Year 9 Camp during Challenge Week will be able to participate in activities such as archery, climbing, mountain biking, kayaking, low roping and hiking. They will also be learning the skills of navigation, first aid, teamwork and cooperation. The camp will be based at the Hampshire Outdoor Centre, Tile Barn in the New Forest from the 23<sup>rd-</sup>26<sup>th</sup> June. Further details can be provided by Mr Wade.



#### **REMINDERS ABOUT CHALLENGE WEEK FOR PARENTS / CARERS**

Whilst not wanting to produce a list of do's and don'ts, it is important to state the following so that everyone is clear about the expectations we have. Then we hope that all of us, staff and students, can have a safe and enjoyable Challenge Week and you, the parents and carers, know what is happening each day.

Challenge Week is compulsory – all students are expected to participate in every day and every activity. If your child is unwell, please follow the usual procedures and phone 02392 259214 and select the 'reporting absent student' option or email <u>absence@oaklandscatholicschool.org</u>. Parents of any student not in school without a valid reason will be contacted during the course of the morning. Students not present without a valid reason will be marked as unauthorised.

The School Behaviour Policy continues to apply during Challenge Week; both for onsite and offsite activities. Students will therefore be subject to the usual range of sanctions should their behaviour fall short in any way of what is expected of students at Oaklands. No monies can be refunded to parents whose child is excluded from subsequent activities.

Students will be allowed to wear their own clothes during Challenge Week, which should be **entirely appropriate** given the nature of the activities and the weather. Skimpy or revealing outfits, inappropriate logos on T-shirts etc are not deemed suitable and students may find themselves unable to participate in an activity if not appropriately dressed.

Each day, students should bring in sun cream / sunhats and a bottle of water to keep themselves safe in the sunshine.

All students on site can bring in a packed lunch or purchase food from the canteen. Students going off site should bring a packed lunch and drink with them. **No** fizzy drinks please. Chewing gum is **not** permitted.

Those students who have free school meals and who are going off site can arrange with Mrs Dodds to collect a packed lunch first thing.

Mobile phones, as always, must be switched off and in bags. Students going off site may of course find it useful to contact parents if the coach is delayed, for example, but the school policy with regard to mobile phones is still in force during Challenge Week. Students will have their phones confiscated if they have them switched on or are using them during the 'school day'.

If students are involved in an off-site activity, please can parents ensure that they note the drop off and pick up times and try to be on time to avoid delayed departure / collection.

The usual access arrangements in school apply. Morning drop-offs along the drive please. The gates will not open before approximately 3.50pm in the afternoons, allowing cars to then collect from the designated pick up points once the buses have departed.
