## From the Headteacher's Desk

During the celebration, Father Jeremy revealed the new name for the parish, which will now be known as Jesus, Prince of Peace. This naming unites the local churches of Sacred Heart of Jesus and St Peter the Apostle in Waterlooville, St Edmund's in Horndean, St Michael and All Angels in Leigh Park, St Joseph's in Havant, St Thomas' in Emsworth, St Patrick's in Hayling Island, St Colman's and St Paul's in Cosham and Paulsgrove. This new parish name reflects a commitment to fostering a sense of community and spiritual growth among the congregations, as they come together under a shared identity and mission. It was a lovely occasion; all credit to the team who organised the celebration.

If Steven Spielberg were to create another film cantered around the Bible, the event of Pentecost would undoubtedly align with the supernatural genre. Imagine the scene: violent winds howling through the streets, flames dancing above the heads of the disciples, and the miraculous ability to understand and speak in various languages instantaneously. # Year 12 Geography

## Field Trip

Last week, Year 10 Geography students enjoyed an exciting field trip to West Wittering and East Wittering, as part of their preparation for the Paper 3 GCSE exam. The day focused on physical and human geography investigations required for the fieldwork element of the course.



At West Wittering, students examined coastal management strategies, particularly the role of groynes in preventing longshore drift. They completed a groyne survey and a longshore drift survey to collect first-hand data on sediment movement and the effectiveness of the defences. Although many groynes are no longer being repaired, the area is part of an adaptive management strategy, where East Head Spit is allowed to change naturally while key infrastructure is protected where necessary.

In East Wittering, the focus shifted to human geography, as students explored the impact of tourism on the local economy. They conducted land use surveys, identifying different building types and their functions, and carried out questionnaires with members of the public. These surveys provided valuable insights into visitors' activities, reasons for visiting the area, and where they had travelled from.

The trip gave students a fantastic opportunity to apply classroom knowledge in a real-world context. Well done to all who took part!

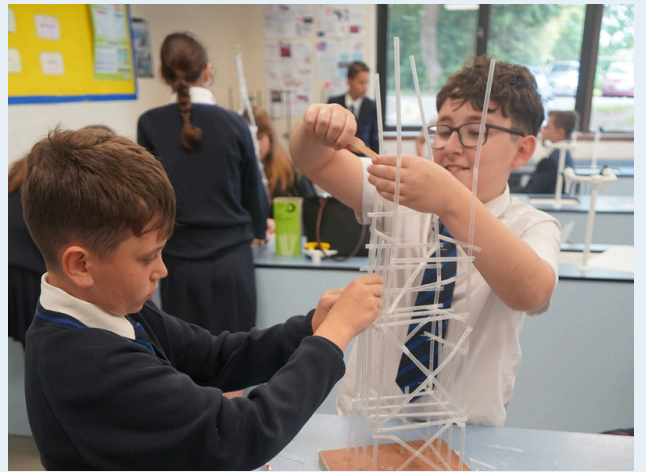


# Year 7 STEM Day

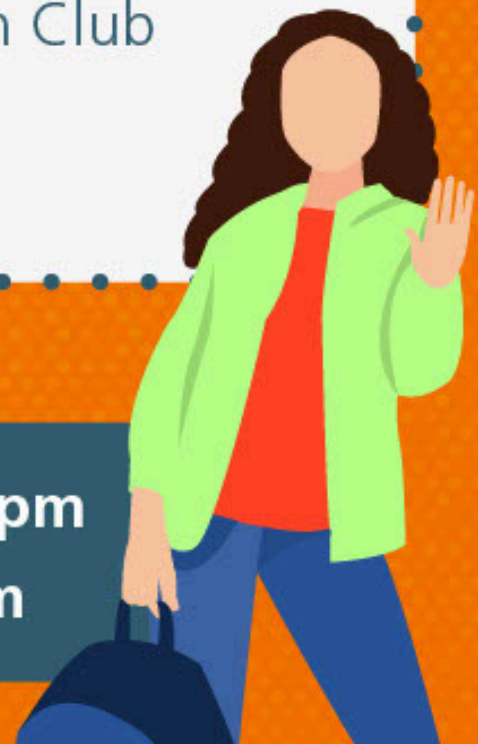
