This moment is significant for everyone involved; students, teachers, and parents alike. The end of exams brings a unique blend of relief, exhaustion, pride, and a touch of uncertainty. It is a time when the weight of expectations lifts, but the emotional and physical toll of the exam season lingers. In this shared experience, everyone can finally take a deep breath and relax a little.

However, this relief often comes hand in hand with exhaustion. One student confided in me last week, saying, 'Mr. Quinn, I'm spent'. It is not just the physical fatigue that weighs heavily; it is the mental drain from being constantly on high alert for an extended period. Student burnout can sneak up quietly, masked by the adrenaline of exam day, only to reveal itself once the pressure eases.

Alongside this fatigue is a sense of pride - sometimes subtle, sometimes overwhelming. Regardless of how the exam season unfolded, reaching the finish line is a significant achievement.

As the dust settles, a new feeling tends to creep in. For some youngsters, the future may suddenly seem more real and daunting. For others, there may be a brief limbo - time off before the cycle begins again in September. Whether our students are now collapsing into bed, throwing a party, or just staring at the ceiling in silence, they have earned the moment. Let it be what it is: messy, emotional, and very human.

The day included a carousel of activities including interview techniques sessions where students learnt about interview styles, what to wear and how to succeed in an interview, and preparation for work experience, learning how to respond to different situations they may face, Health and Safety at Work and how to get the most out of their work experience.

A highlight of the day was the financial literacy workshops delivered by our valued partners at Citizens Advice Havant. These interactive sessions covered budgeting, understanding payslips, managing money, and avoiding debt – practical life skills that will serve our students well beyond their school years.

This comprehensive preparation ensures our Year 10 students approach their upcoming work experience placements with confidence, equipped with both professional skills and financial awareness.

Year 12 Biology Field Trip

Year 12 Biology students recently set off on a field-based ecology investigation, beginning at Dell Quay and concluding at Fishbourne Marshes. Guided by officers from the Chichester Conservancy Educational Centre, they explored species sampling techniques, statistical testing, and carried out independent research that contributed to their core practical accreditation for A Level studies.



The day began with an exciting crab collection activity, where students measured the crustaceans' sizes relative to their proximity to the shore. The enthusiastic squeals revealed just how impressive some of them were!

After lunch, we explored the brackish water ecology at Dell Quay, where students conducted a random survey of the saltmarshes. They examined the impact of factors such as seawater coverage on the distribution and abundance of coastal plants, comparing areas submerged daily with those covered only a few times a season.

The trip concluded at Fishbourne Marshes, where students moved on to freshwater ecology investigations, measuring species abundance and distribution in both slow- and fast-flowing streams. Wet feet were inevitable, but the thriving wildlife made up for it! As a team, they demonstrated resilience, problem-solving, and strong spirit throughout the day.

The valuable data collected will now undergo statistical analysis to assess variations in species distribution and the correlation between abiotic and biotic factors. This hands-on experience provided students with invaluable skills and a deeper appreciation of their local harbour.

A huge thank you to Mrs Gorman and Miss Lenihan for their enthusiasm and expertise in making this trip such a success—as well as the wonderful weather we enjoyed. We eagerly anticipate another fantastic trip next June.

Gospel Reflection: John 21:15-19

Peter and Paul were very different - Peter was a simple fisherman who denied Jesus, and Paul was a well-educated man who once persecuted Christians. But both were transformed by God's love and became bold leaders of the Church.

Their lives remind us that God does not call the perfect; He calls

those who are willing to follow Him. No matter your past, God can do great things through us when we say yes. Saints Peter and Paul, pray for us.

How can the example of Saints Peter & Paul Help Us?

The lives of Saints Peter and Paul offer powerful examples of trust and hope, not because they were perfect, but because they were deeply human and still responded to God's call with courage and faith.

Peter shows us how to trust God even after failure. Paul shows us how to hope in God's power to change lives and fulfil His mission.

What Trust and Hope Mean

Trust means confident reliance on God's character believing that He is faithful, good and in control, even when we do not understand what is happening.

Hope means living with confident expectation that God will fulfil His promises - especially the ultimate hope of eternal life and renewal of all things.

CST - The Common Good

This principle is about helping those who are most in need - 'those lacking something important to be able to live life well'.

In the early 1970s, the Sisters of Christ started this school as a comprehensive school for girls and boys. They wanted to offer a good education to all children regardless of faith or sex.

How is this a way of putting 'option for the poor' in to action? Today, what are the signs that we are still doing this as a school?
