I have been blessed by a troupe of outstanding colleagues. The true strength of this school lies in the collective spirit and unwavering support that colleagues extend to one another and to the students they nurture.

I want to express my heartfelt gratitude to parents for entrusting your children to the school under my leadership. The partnership between school and home is critical in any successful school. Your prayers, support, and faith in the vision have played a crucial role in shaping Oaklands into what it is today. Our achievements would not have been possible without your love and encouragement.

Leaving any position is not easy, but you have to accept the inevitability of it, when you start something at some point it has to finish; transitions are a natural part of any journey. I am comforted by the knowledge that the school is in a strong position, supported by a passionate staff, a dedicated governing body and clergy, and a caring community of students and families.

I am confident that the future holds continued growth and success. I will forever carry with me the lessons, the memories, and the relationships I have formed here. This school has shaped me as much as I have shaped it, and I leave with a full heart and a deep sense of gratitude.

Thank you once again for your trust, your kindness, and your support over the years. It has been the honour of my career.

From the Governors

As another academic year moves towards a conclusion, it is a time for looking backwards and forwards. Firstly, thank you to the Governors for all the work they have done that contributes to governance of Oaklands. In particular, a big thank you to Father Jeremy who supported Oaklands as a Governor as well as supporting the work of the whole Governing Body. At the



same time, we welcomed Father Andrew as a Governor, who will link with the RE department and help us ensure that the Catholic ethos is at the heart of Oaklands and all Governor activity.

It has been a busy year; Governors have been impressed and entertained by the amazing Culture Show, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, and the Christmas and Summer music concerts. We have seen school and parishes come together at the Pentecost Mass on Sunday 8th June as well as seeing and participating in the Catholic life of the school in community masses, assemblies, and acts of worship. Every year Governors are impressed by the achievements of the pupils, such as the Year 8 Science projects and the Design Showcase. Governors have visited every department within the school, to discuss how each one is performing and how we (as Governors) can help. This is all part of the Governors' responsibility to set the strategic aims, core values and ethos of the school, in line with Government, Diocesan and Trust expectations. We are then able to hold the school leadership to account for delivery of the strategy, supporting and challenging where necessary. We have analysed teaching and learning outcomes, looked at implementation of policies such as the updated behaviour policy and curriculum, and looked at the financial and business management probity of the school.



Oaklands has successfully gained a grant of £1.4m for urgent structural repairs to the White House and roof replacement to the Sports Hall, to ensure both are safe and appropriate spaces for education in the coming decades. Despite the size of the grant, the school has to make a contribution to the project and we are looking to raise £50,000.

Whilst this seems like a lot of money, divided by 700 families making a small contribution each year, the funds will accumulate quickly. Every contribution to the Governors' Development fund will go towards this vital project. The easiest way of donating is via the QR code above.

As you are all aware, there are changes in the coming year, with Mr Quinn retiring after successfully leading the school for eighteen years. I know everyone will send their sincere thanks to him for all he has done for the Oaklands Community. The Governors have been working to secure excellent leadership for the coming year, with Mr Cunningham as Interim Executive Headteacher and Mrs Bonnington as Interim Head of School. The Governors will continue to work closely with the Trust, the Governors of St Peter's, and the senior leadership of Oaklands to ensure the school continues to provide high quality, Christ centred education, making sure every young person has the opportunity to develop to their full potential, in body, mind and spirit.

Finally, Governors are very aware of all the work of both teachers and support staff at Oaklands put into all the events that take place, on top of their daily education and pupil support activities. So, the biggest thank you goes to each and every member of the Oaklands Community who work so hard to make the school what it is. We wish them a very relaxing and refreshing summer and look forward to seeing them, the pupils and parents in the next academic year.

Catholic Social Teaching and the Oaklands Mission

At the beginning this academic year, we celebrated our first whole school Mass school on 13 September. The Mass was for our school's patronal Feast of the Exultation of the Cross (14 September). In the lead up to the Mass, we had assemblies focusing on the history of our school, especially our motto, 'United by The Cross'. The Cross is literally and symbolically at



the heart of everything we do here at Oaklands because it is a sign our Charism of love and service.

One practical way of doing this is our focus on the principles of Catholic Social Teaching. We believe that these principles are key to what we do and what we are about. In doing all this, we are fulfilling our call to Care for Creation and live in Peace with each other, following in the example of Jesus the Prince of Peace.

As a faith school, we chose these eight principles because they are a very practical way for us to fulfil our mission statement of Community Unity Opportunity.

When the Sisters of Christ started this school, they intended it to be a place where all experienced God's love.

We pray that You make our school a great place to form, inform, transform and reform our students so that they grow spiritually, physically, socially, and mentally. Make our school a place where they feel loved, where they love and learn to love.
