Year 7: History/STEM Day



The Y7 History/Science STEM Day, titled "The Body in the Library", provided our newest cohort with the opportunity to spend time away from their busy timetables to conduct investigation work. It targeted their understanding of how both Science and History must come together to support a CSI-style investigation.

Students took on the role of a detective, looking at potential victims and their profiles. This allowed them to decipher situational evidence to create a hypothesis from which to conduct experiments. They acted as crime scene investigators by assessing the evidence found at the scene and considering how it might link to the experiments and individuals.

In the Science labs, students had the opportunity to explore forensic science methods, including DNA profiling, fingerprinting and studying bone density. These experiments enabled them to further link suspects and start to eliminate suspects.

They brought everything together in the form of an operations board, displaying their work to their peers before discovering the identity of the victim. This gave them the chance to showcase everything they had done throughout the day and prove that they could work as a team to succeed.

Culture Week

Furthermore, students are encouraged to actively engage in the celebration by participating in activities such as reading the liturgy of the word, or learning the duties of altar serving.

In this passage, Jesus encounters a funeral procession - a widow mourning the loss of her only son.


Moved by deep compassion, He tells her, 'Do not weep' and then restores her son to life

All Souls Day

All Souls (celebrated on 2nd November) is a Christian day of remembrance dedicated to praying for the souls of the dead, especially those believed to be in purgatory - a state of purification before entering heaven. It follows All Saints' Day (1st November) and reflects the belief in the communion of saints, connecting the living and the deceased through prayer and remembrance.



All Souls' Day is important to Christians because it expresses love, hope, and faith in God's mercy and the promise of eternal life. It reminds believers that death does not end relationships - the faithful on earth can still help the souls of the departed through prayer, Mass, and good works.
